Fall Watering Important For Ornamental Shrubs

At this time of the year many gardeners in Halton have rolled up their garden hose and stored it away. This should not be the case. Many ornamental trees and shrubs still need water, particularly as fall rains have been light.

Lack of moisture in the tissues of trees and shrubs before winter sets in is often one of the causes of winter killing. Evergreens are particularly susceptible to this kind of injury. During sunny, winter days, evergreens such as cedars will lose moisture from their leaves and as their roots are in frozen soil this moisture cannot be replaced. The result is that the foliage becomes brown and unsightly. Horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture say that this type of injury can be minimized. Make sure that ornamental shrubs and trees have sufficient water before the soil freezes.

The best method for watering is to wrap a piece of cloth or burlap around the nozzle of the hose and place it near the tree trunk. This cuts down the possibility of washing away soil around the tree and exposing its roots to cool temperatures.

Lawns also should have special attention at this time of year. All leaves and debris should be raked off the lawn, say horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture. If large leaves such as maple leaves are left lying on the grass all winter the grass may be smothered, and bare patches will result. Winter injury often occurs when traffic is allowed across frozen turf. Severe damage can occur if a sheet of ice such as a skating rink for children lies on the turf for long periods particularly if the turf is not frozen before the ice is formed.
