Six Contest Three Seats On Esquering School Bd.

Acclamation Returns All Councillors to Office

Before a crowd of close to population now stands at 128 two hundred in the Stewart Hall on Monday night, \$252,000,000 said the reeve, the complete Esquering Council was re-elected by acclamation. The council will consist of Reeve George Leslie, Deputy Reeve Wilfrid Leslie and Councillors George Currie, Walter Linham and Robert Lawson.

With no contest for Council, interest will centre on the six-man fight for three vacant seats on the Esquering School Board. The three incumbents are Robert Cunningham, Mac Sprout and Wm. A. Lawson.

In addition, Lloyd Fisher, Frank Robertson and Frank McKerr were nominated for the vacant seats.

As was reported in last week's Herald, Clerk-Treasurer K. C. Lindsay reading from the interim report, forecast a \$13 surplus this year, which will be added to an accumulated surplus of \$18,025.

In his own homespun down-to-earth way, Reeve G. Leslie thanked the ratepayers for putting up with me for another year. He spoke of the growth of the county.

Storm Lifts Barn Roof Interrupts Rural Hydro

Gales of hurricane force early Saturday morning tore away the roof of a barn north of here in the Georgetown area with hydro and telephone workers began converting the area with some parts of the town, trees felled and branches blocking some roads.

This was probably the worst hit area in Halton County. Winds gusted to 62 miles per hour and knocked the hydro services out particularly north and south of town. Many Georgetown RR farms were without power from early in the morning some from 4 a.m. until past noon.

Winds near Hornby ripped the steel roof off a large barn belonging to Roy Break on the 9th Line and dumped it in the yard, narrowly missing some of the livestock.

This was the barn moved from the Bingham farm north of here in the Georgetown area five years ago when the workers began converting the area with some parts of the town, trees felled and branches blocking some roads.

On one road a line of poles was flattened.

Hydro servers in Silver Creek were cut from pre-dawn until noon because of wires ripped from their mountings.

Also literally blown off the posts were strings of Christmas decorative lighting on Mill and Main St.

None of the dozens of huge limbs that came crashing down in town during the night touched power lines and hydro here was not interrupted.
