Town Line House Burns During High Windstorm

The high winds that lashed this district on Friday night and Saturday morning caused considerable damage to property and trees. Many were without hydro for several hours, caused from tree limbs falling on the wires and one house on the outskirts of the village was burned to the ground. Mr. and Mrs. W. Faulkner, who have recently opened The Music Box, were awakened on a passer-by about 2:15 a.m. and told that the house next door was on fire. Mr. and Mrs. Faulkner and family were partially moved from the house into quarters at The Music Box. Much of their furniture and clothing was still in the house which was completely destroyed. There are six Faulkner children, Nancy, age 10; Allen 8; Ruth 6; David 5 and twins Peter and Paul, who will soon be 3.

The cause of the fire is unknown. Georgetown firemen were on the scene from about 2:30 to 3:30 as the high winds made the blaze hard to control and there was danger from flying sparks. 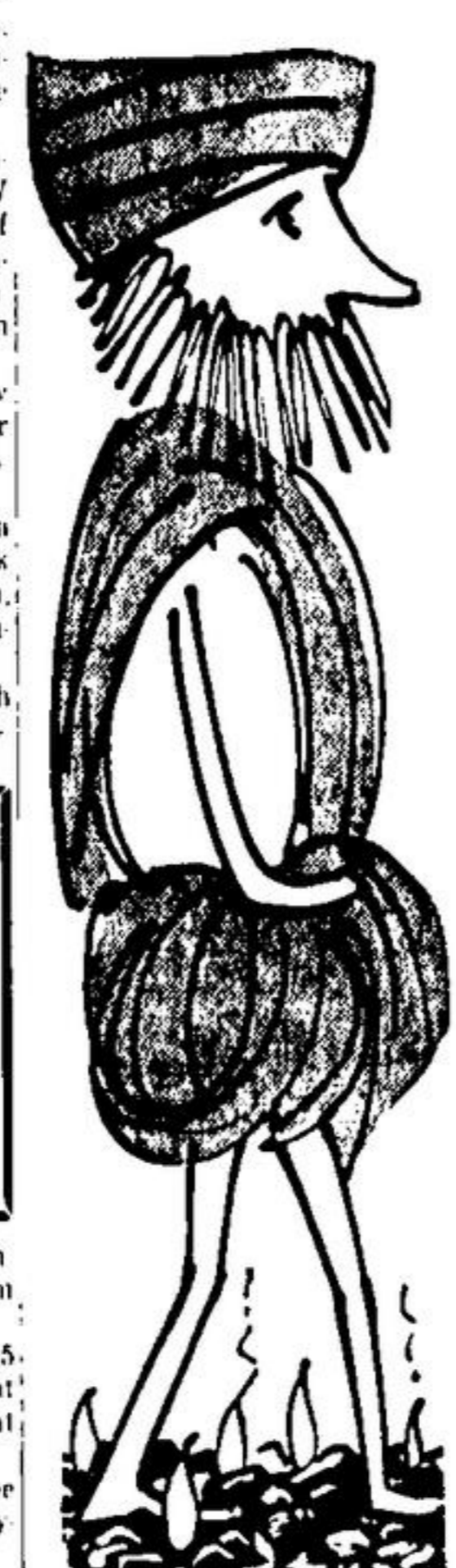

OTTAWA REPORT
BI-MONTHLY OBSERVATIONS BY DR. HARRY HARLEY, M.P. FOR HALTON

As an aid to the unemployed in the older age group, the Government has brought into force an "Older Worker Employment and Training Incentive Program." It became effective on November 1, 1963. The Government has initiated this program which is designed to assist long-term unemployed mature men and women to secure employment and to secure necessary skills. This plan involves incentive payments to employers who hire eligible older workers between November 1, 1963 and January 31, 1964. The payments will amount to 50 per cent of the monthly wage paid or \$75.00 per month, whichever is less, to assist employers during the period an eligible older worker is being given the training and work experience necessary for his continued employment.

Conditions governing the payment of incentives to employers are as follows:

1. Incentive payments apply only to employment which is insurable under the Unemployment Insurance Act, excluding employment by governments at all levels and by government-owned business enterprises.
2. The employer must provide the worker with a written offer of approved on-the-job training or if this is inappropriate, other approved programs to assist the worker.
3. The employer must hire the worker during the period November 1, 1963 to January 31, 1964 and employ the worker or his eligible replacement for at least three months before the incentive becomes payable.
4. The worker must not be employed in a job vacated by another worker after September 1, 1963.

eligibility of workers for employment under the program are as follows:

1. The worker must be 45 years of age or over and not in full-time employment at the time of hiring.
2. The worker must not be eligible for regular unemployment insurance benefits.
3. The worker must have been unemployed for at least six of previous nine months. Evidence of unemployment can be provided by registration with the National Unemployment Service, receipt of unemployment assistance payments or other satisfactory evidence of attachment to the labour market.
4. The worker must not be in receipt of the universal Old Age Pension or any other retirement or pension benefit equivalent to or higher than the amount of universal Old Age Pension.
5. The worker must be the only member of the family household for whom an incentive payment is made.

The National Employment Service will be responsible for the implementation of the program at the community level.
