use of hydro heating for new houses. He says hydro heat is not the cheapest, but is the best. He has seen many changes in his time in office, as the town grew from 2500 to almost 11,000. Cycle conversion, new office and service depot, new substations and lines have resulted from the town's growth.

Nominees Speak

Only other nominees to speak were Oliver Brownridge and John Henley. Mr. Brownridge complained about being eliminated from a previous council race because of claimed unpaid taxes which later, proved to be incorrect. He is critical of council which "sets their own wages and operates behind closed doors," as he phrased it. "Did you choose men who have proven they can run their own businesses?" was his question. John Henley had an unusual reason for being nominated for mayor.

"I did it simply so I could speak and recommend the stately in the loss of a sister. The present council is the best Georgetown has had for a number of years and the best we will get for a number of years to come."

He criticized the local newspapers... "one with no backbone and one with no policy" for not promoting an idea he has propounded that a committee of local specialists be drafted to assist council.

A PERSONAL MESSAGE TO YOU from JOE

This letter is intended to be one of importance to the Municipal Voter at the election in Georgetown, Monday, December 2.

I have decided to offer my services as Mayor to the citizens of Georgetown for the year of 1964, because I am convinced I can remedy a SERIOUS FINANCIAL MESS that exists in the Town of Georgetown at the present time.

Many electors, no doubt, remember the Mayor's published statement last year. To use his words, "he would hold the tax rate regardless of the 1962 deficit," but the result was an increase of 2 1/2 mills on Residential and 5 mills on Commercial and Industrial property and Business tax. A RECORD HIGH for Georgetown and much higher than any other municipality in Ontario and I ask the Mayor, "What are the people getting in return for this excessive taxation?" Shall we continue to listen to empty promises of reduced taxation?

What About the Future?

Arrangements are being made at the present time to celebrate next year, what the Mayor calls "Georgetown's Centennial" which would cost the Ratepayers thousands of dollars on what is only a silly illusion that it is "Centennial Year." The By-law passed by County Council in 1864 which was recently published in the local Press was nothing more, or less, than to extend and confirm the boundaries of the Corporation. A similar one was passed when Georgetown annexed 1,800 acres in 1954.

Municipal Building

I have reason to believe Georgetown has, or had, one of the most suitable Municipal Offices in Halton County. Why did the 1963 Mayor want to dispose of it? It is built and designed for at least 1 more storey if needed in the future. It cost more than \$80,000 to construct (by tender contract) and was sacrificed at a price of \$32,500. This, coupled with the purchase of the old Post Office Building is, I submit, an expensive affront to the citizens. The \$17,500 mentioned by the Mayor to transform this building would not pay for TRANSPLANTING THE TULIPS FROM THE ISLANDS ON OUR MAIN STREET.

If I am elected to give Municipal leadership for the coming year I shall make an effort to render null and void any contracts made this year INVOLVING THE EXPENDITURE OF MONEY NEXT YEAR for the so-called Centennial and the sale and purchase of the above mentioned buildings.

Without any malice, whatsoever, I have offered what I intended to be constructive criticism of members of Council in the past. One of my chief objections and criticisms of the present council is holding SECRET MEETINGS to transact public business. The people have a right to know how their money is collected and spent. To make it sound better, Council call these meetings "Committees of the Whole." A recent Press report quoted the Mayor as saying, "We might possibly end up this year in the 'blue'." He promised further disclosures at a secret meeting from which the Press and taxpayers would be excluded.

My Promise to You

If elected Mayor for the year 1964, I SHALL REDUCE THE TAX-RATE, which is the outstanding reason why industry is not interested in establishing in Georgetown. This can be accomplished WITHOUT curtailing any civic services.

I am offering my services to the people of Georgetown without any thought of personal gain. It is my intention if elected Mayor, to have no salary attached thereto. I shall follow the example of the School Board, and the many men and women, who are giving much time and thought to the church of their faith, their lodges, their service clubs, Arena Board, Library Board, Cemetery Board, and numerous other Boards, and Commissions without any thought of any monetary gain, and especially at this time when there is such a large debenture debt and high taxation mess to clean up.

Therefore, if I am elected as Mayor, one of my first actions will be to introduce a By-law to suspend any payment to the Mayor, or members of Council for the year 1964.

I am also unalterably opposed to a two-year term. I submit if the present Council (as presently constituted) were elected for two years, it would be the greatest Municipal Dictatorship in the Province.

Fellow electors, I am prepared to devote my full time, if necessary, to serve FREE the people of Georgetown - the Town that has been so good to me, both in my Public and Private life and in victory or defeat, I owe my time to Georgetown civic welfare and community betterment.

If you accept this letter as sincerity and honesty, then I shall appreciate your support at the polls on Monday, Dec. 2.
