Scotsdale also drew a red ribbon in the following classes: the summer yearling bull, junior heifer calf and mature female. Gardhouse had the senior and grand champion bull, Aberfeldy Deacon, who was also named Supreme Champion of the show. The Gardhouse senior bull calf, Aberfeldy Exchequer, was named reserve junior champion bull (Gardhouse's senior heifer, calf, Aberfeldy Waterloo Delight, was named reserve junior champion female). Other red ribbons going to Gardhouse were pair of bulls, set of sire, and three calves.

FARMER'S WEEK PLANNED

A new program will be available to Halton farmers, February 24th to 28th, 1964. The Ontario Agricultural College is holding a "Farmer's Week." This new program is being offered for those who wish to profit from the latest information on the handling of soils, crops and livestock.

The first day, Monday, February 24, will be on Soils and Crops. Subjects to be covered include fertilizer use and handling crop residues and manure, crop systems using corn.

The second day will be devoted to soils and forage production. Other programs include a Dairy Cattle Day with discussions on use of production records, feeding systems, and trends in housing for dairy cows. The "Swine Day" will include outlook in the Swine Industry, S.P.F. Pigs, restricted feeding.

HALTON MEDICAL CHIEF IRKED BY PERFORMANCE QUESTIONNAIRE

Dr. Archie Bull, Halton Co. medical officer, has accused the county of issuing a performance questionnaire to his staff that does not apply to the operation of a health unit but rather to the operation of an assembly line.

The MOH also locked horns with county council on the matter of the principle involved where one board of council (Personnel and Office Administration Committee) is reporting to another committee of council (Halton Health Unit) on the matter of salaries for his staff.

He said there are adequate controls on the matter of salary considerations since four members of county council together with an appointee of the Lieutenant Governor form the present Health Unit Board. County council members were informed last Tuesday that the conflict came about due to a misinterpretation of the Health Act Regulations by the Honourable M. B. Dymond, minister of health.

Dr. Bull further suggested the personnel committee would be well advised to draw up a salary schedule for clerical staff outlining minimum and maximum salaries together with increment payments. He also said he would like to see a joint salary committee between the board of health and the personnel committee formed and he would meet with council to meet with Dr. Bull in a joint meeting at 2 p.m. November 20th, in the county administration building.

Council was informed that Dr. Bull agreed to submit a form of questionnaire which he thought might be applicable to certain operations of county namely the Health Unit, the Children's Aid Society and the Home for the Aged.

Scores Halton Stand on Grants For Mental Health

County council was severely criticized last week for being too cheap and withdrawing support formerly given to the Halton branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association.

Noting that one person out of 10 becomes mentally ill and that Halton has a population of 120,000, he said the county did very little about lending a helping hand.

Noting the meeting was the first one held in Milton, Mrs. Gilmore, a local director, said she had informed the health unit, the public and high school principals, service clubs and others of the meeting. No one has flatly turned down the invitations to attend, she said, but there was an obvious lack of understanding of the seriousness of mental health problems indicated by the small turnout for the meeting. Only five members of the public turned up.

Mr. Spout said it was a sad state of affairs that the county had done so little for a number one problem when so much money is spent on other things.

He said over \$100 million is already being spent to assist the mentally sick and another \$100 million was spent taking care of the families and relatives when the chronic patient is incapable of making a living. Added to the time lost at work and wasted man hours, said Spout, the cost to the nation is \$45 million a year, which is a loss of approximately \$300 per family across the country.
