**Eight to Receive Prized High School Certificates**

Eight Georgetown High School graduates, members of this year's graduating class, will receive prizes and certificates from the members of the senior teaching staff (Grade 13) will sit down at a graduation dinner in the high school cafeteria Friday, November 29, at 6:30 p.m. Proceeding the Senior Commencement Exercises in the school auditorium.

The speaker will be Georgetown High School graduate Douglas Wrigglesworth, now a member of the Leaside High School teaching staff. The presentation of prizes and certificates will be followed by a presentation of two Ontario admission scholarships, three university admission scholarships and a presentation of honours rolls.

The audience will be entertained by the Georgetown High School orchestra and choir.

**Sparks Fly, Employment Procedure Stays Same**

Conflicting opinions about how municipal employees should be engaged, led to a brief flurry at Monday's council meeting when Mayor Hyde and Reeve Elliott exchanged verbal remarks. The question stemmed back to September when an amendment was passed that the administration committee approve the hiring of all town employees and of temporary help engaged for more than two weeks.

In October, this motion was rescinded and replaced with one which says the status of new and temporary employees will be reviewed by the administration committee 30 days after hiring and at the end of a three month period an employee can be placed on permanent staff only by a resolution passed by council.

On Monday, a Hunter Young motion called for rescinding this. It was to be followed by another motion setting forth a new procedure. But when the rescinding motion was defeated, the new procedure never got off the ground.

Deputy Reeve Hunter said he had moved the October motion but had since changed his mind.

"The October motion is adequate and I will oppose this," said Mayor Hyde.

When the deputy reeve recalled that the administration committee, which recommended the October motion had been "split down the middle" in its recommendation and that the decision had carried in committee only because a non-member who had attended voted for it, Mayor Hyde became irritated.

"The committee meeting was like all others this year, including your road committee," he snapped at the deputy reeve. "Anyone attending a meeting can vote."

"That's true," said Mr. Hunter. "I just wanted to point out that the committee itself was split down the middle. I think this new motion will be a step in the right direction."

A recorded vote was taken and the motion was lost when entitled to trial says HALTON COUNTY JUDGE.

"Lee Harvey Oswald was accused of murder but he was entitled to a fair trial and not to be shot down like a wild animal," Halton County Judge George E. Elliott said at the commencement of the non-racy hearings of the Ontario Supreme Court in the county building last Monday.

It has not been proved and it never likely will be proved who it was who shot President John F. Kennedy, Judge Elliott said.

Writing the judge's order of judgment, he addressed the Hon. Justice Haines and the court.

He said it was a "horrible thing when a man who voluntarily attempts to serve a free nation, John F. Kennedy, is brought to the calculated risk of being assassinated."

"Someone said on TV Friday that Kennedy's life was wasted," continued Judge Elliott. "I cannot see or agree that his life was wasted any more than a soldier who sacrifices his life in war."

Speaking for the Halton Bar Association and for the town is the judge said he felt it was the duty of judges, lawyers, public officers and every citizen to create a respect for law and order and to protect a man's right not to have to worry about his life or property.

He concluded: "We must dedicate ourselves in this country to law and order and must have a respect for the courts at all times."
