Fate Kind, Lince Misses Trip on Crashed Plane

A quirk of fate saved Earl Lince, 20 Parkview Blvd. from being a passenger on the TCA jet which crashed on Friday night near St. Therese, P.Q. Actually, Mr. Lince, returning home from a two-day business trip in Montreal, for his firm, Sterling Plastics, was held up by traffic and arrived at the airport just two minutes before his scheduled Flight 540 took off.

Meanwhile Flight 831 (the fatal one) was also fully booked. A baby passenger and Mr. Lince were stand-bys for this flight and he chatted with her as they waited. One seat proved vacant and was assigned to the lady while Mr. Lince had to wait for the next plane.

He became aware of the tragedy only when he switched his car radio on during his trip home from Montreal.

Meanwhile a Montreal business associate, knowing his booking, had phoned Mrs. Lince. But despite his assurances she had some anxious moments until her husband walked to the door of their home.

Later Mr. Lince learned that a friend, Dick Buh, a plastics engineer with C.I.L., who was also well known to many Smith & Stone employees, lost his life in the crash.

Bonus Cheque Pair Sent To Kingston

A month long cheque-passing spree may have netted a West Flamboro couple over \$2,000 in cash and merchandise from Halton businesses, but it cost them four and a half years in Kingston Penitentiary. Magistrate Kenneth Langdon passed sentence Friday, following conviction of the pair in court a week ago. The couple pleaded guilty to eighteen counts of fraud for passing worthless cheques to druggists, mechanics and others.

Government Replies, Says Action for Industry Good

Replies to Georgetown's protest about industrial incentives for "slow growth" areas were received by council this week from Prime Minister Pearson and Halton MP Dr. Harry Har-ley.

Both letters noted the government's position in trying to encourage industry to locate in such areas and that they believe the overall effect will be beneficial to the Canadian economy.

A third letter, from the Area Development Agency, pointed out Georgetown's fears that industry might be induced away are groundless because legislation applies only to new industries.

"Maybe not, but an industry when expanding, could decide to build a second plant somewhere else rather than in its own location," said Cr. Pow-ers.

Cr. Jim Emerson thinks the government should compensate a town which might suffer industrial loss in this way. Cr. Charles Hildebrandt said he thinks Georgetown might be a little selfish in its protest. But Mayor Hyde said he disagrees with the basis for naming slow growth areas in the first place.

"It's based on unemployment figures, and many of our residents are commuters so naturally if there is less employment in town residents might still be working elsewhere," he said.

He thinks cities like Windsor and Brantford have not carried as big a load in the past as Georgetown and don't deserve their slow growth designation because they are in a temporary lull.

Unitarians Protest Adoption Rejection

At least ten local people signed a letter protesting the action of the Simcoe County Children's Aid in rejecting the application of a Toronto couple on religious grounds.

The letter was sent to Dr. Matthew B. Dymond, Minister of Public Health and Welfare, by the 70 members of the Unitarian Congregation of South Peel.

The letter pointed out that the family was qualified in every way, and the woman even agreed to take the child to church regularly, but the child was refused their because they would not exert pressure on him to continue his church affiliation when an adult. The husband did not attend church.

Dr. Dymond was asked to use the power of his office to have the action of the Simcoe County Children's Aid reversed, and a copy was sent to the Hon. Judy LaMarsh, Min-
