Martin, who presented Brenda's trophy, praised the children for "helping to exemplify the work of the Halton Fire Prevention Bureau." He noted: "County is proud of this Bureau. It is one of the things that is keeping Halton to the fore." George Kerr of Burlington, Halton's M.P.P., presented the trophy to Jeffery, and said he thought the annual poster competition was a wonderful idea. "I can not think of a more practical way to impress fire prevention upon the youngsters of the County," he added.
