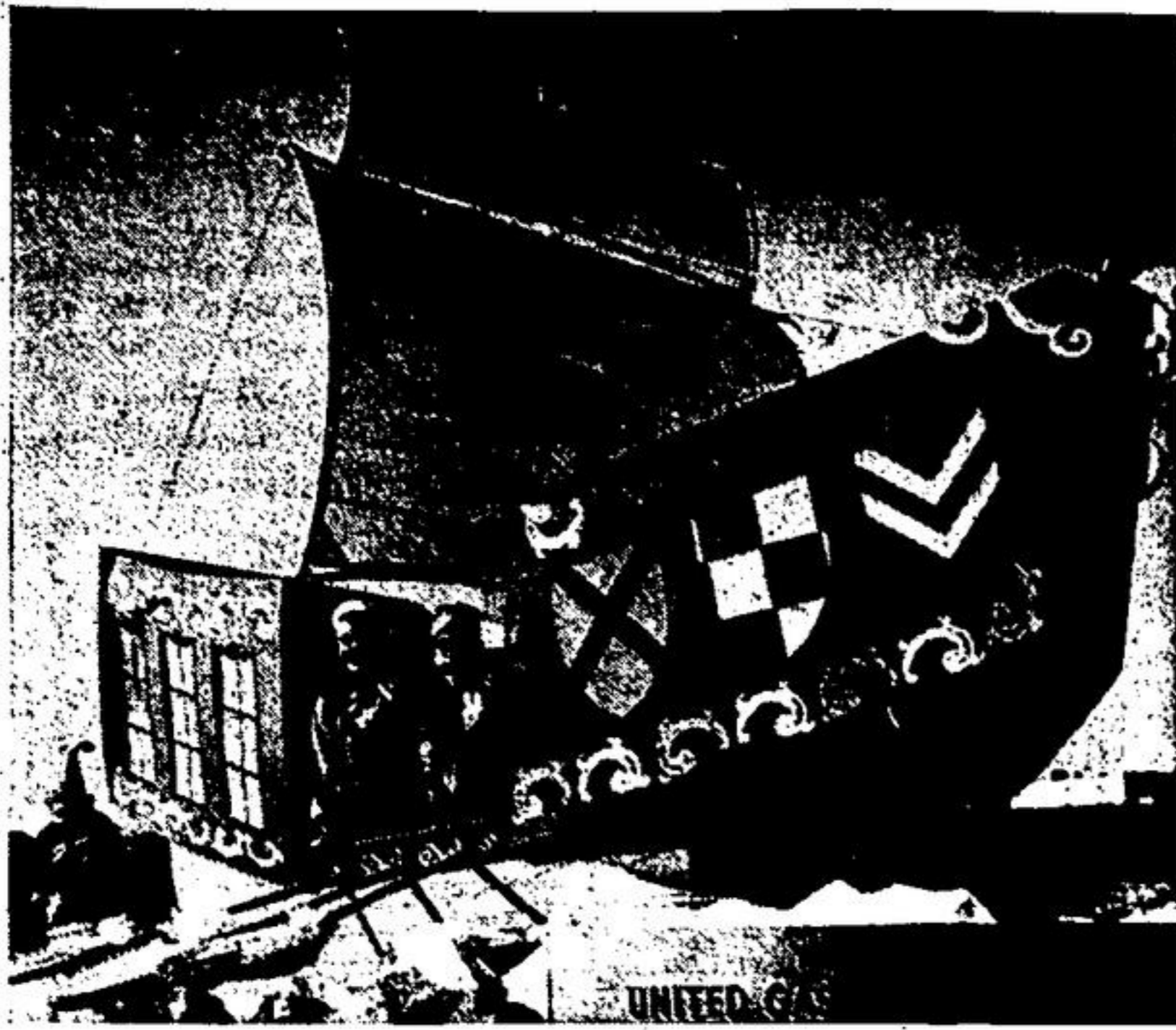


WINNER A "GASSER"

DISTRICT NEWS OAKVILLE

Strong opposition to the projected site of low cost rental housing project was voiced this week by a group of Ward 2 residents who declared themselves "ready to do anything" to stop the project from entering the planning stage. The proposal is to build 60 housing units on town-owned land in Brampton.

Following a citizen's complaint that a number of birds were found dying in front of the Liquor Control Board Store, a reporter inquired there and discovered a "bird repellent" had been applied to the sign. The substance sticks to the birds' wings and feet and they are unable to fly for four or five minutes.

Acton Hydro Commission wound up a nine-month investigation and finalized plans last week to sign a purchase agreement with a Toronto firm for a new "aerial squirrel" at an approximate cost of \$10,700. The "thing" can drill holes, lift poles, lift transformers, pull wires over cross-arms, hoist linemen to the top and, as Tuesday, Dec. 23 and thing else necessary in hydro work.
