Claims Hammer Beating, Robbery By 4 Youths

A 30 year old Streetsville man William G. Watson, told a jury Monday, Dec. 2 he was attacked with a hammer and beaten by four youths he had offered a ride. He said during the assault he heard threats to hang him. Watson was robbed of his wallet, wrist watch and shoes about three miles east of Georgetown.

Recalling the beating which occurred July 23 on the 6th line south of Norval, Mr. Watson said he pleaded with them for the sake of his family not to hang him.

Testifying against one of the youths charged with robbery and violence and assault causing bodily harm he said he met the youths in Norval. Two youths are already serving five year terms for their part in the act.

Investigating a call from a farm house in the area Ching Amos told the court he found Watson sitting on the side of the road his face covered with blood and a blood covered shirt tied to his wrists. He said the shirt was tied so tightly the shirt had to be cut off in his petal.

A doctor testified that when Watson was admitted to hospital he had a broken nose, swollen eyes, numerous contusions and bruises.

The accused said he kicked and punched Watson after he had gotten in his car because he thought Watson had struck him a blow with a hammer. It turned out the hammer was an antique welded by one of the youths in the back seat to knock Watson unconscious.

\$35,000 Winter Program is Endorsed for Conservation

Approval of a winter works program to the extent of \$35,000 was received from the Dept. of Municipal Affairs last week by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. Deputy Treasurer George W. Bentley said on Friday.

This approval for the development of conservation areas is a joint project of the federal and provincial governments to improve the unemployment problem through this coming winter.

Employment for approximately 35 men would be made available through the Authority. Extension of picnic and camping facilities in the Terra Cotta Conservation Area is already under way and will be completed this winter.

The men would be employed clearing, thinning and pruning forest areas, building and renovating conservation area facilities, such as shelters, tables and small buildings and building a machine shed. Developing roads and fencing within the conservation areas would be so part of the work involved.

There could possibly be work on channel improvements and removing log jams along the Credit River. Mr. Bentley said.

The winter works program extends to April 30, 1964. The Authority has had applications to plant 132,000 trees after spring break-up in 1964 and expects more applications to be forthcoming.

Last year 243,000 trees were planted in the watershed during the spring. This would give his wife a head
