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Council Discusses Dropping Second Garbage Pick-Up

Stopping of the second garbage pick-up for Main Street stores by the garbage collector was discussed by council at Monday's meeting. Two weeks ago the contractor advertised that the second pick-up would be discontinued as of December 6th and merchants wishing a second pick-up must make private arrangements for this. Last Friday most business places on Main St. put garbage out as usual and it sat until late afternoon. Public Works chairman Charles Hildebrandt said he was unaware of this until Monday and contacted the town foreman who agreed to use a town truck to dispose of it. Meanwhile, the town clerk at evening calls from merchants had persuaded the contractor to make the extra pick-up that day. "It's his right to discontinue, as this is not called for in the contract," said Cr. Hildebrandt. But the contractor had agreed to this and to cover industrial waste at the disposal site in lieu of stipulations in the contract which are not being fulfilled. Mayor Hyde pointed out "He's in violation in other matters and as far as I'm concerned, when I found the mess he created on Main Street I don't feel he should get any other cheque until the matter is cleared up."
