Christmas Shopping
Christmas shopping need not be such a chore. Like anything else, it can be made much easier with some planning and forethought.
Shop first at stores where you regularly trade during the year. You know where everything is to be found. Plan your trip through the store, on paper. Make a list of items you are interested in, separating them by the departments in which they are located.
