Leave Bicycle at Home  
Safety Officer Advice

"This town's been pretty lucky. There have been no serious bicycle accidents in the past couple of years and we hope to keep it that way," said traffic safety officer Ted Scott yesterday.

He was commenting on the hazardous road conditions the youngsters face who take chances bicycling on streets now that winter snow is here.

Because of the efforts parents and police make to warn and keep youngsters off their bicycles during this time of the year, the accident rate has been about the same as it is for the rest of the year, the Oakville police safety director stated.

He cited a few reasons why children should stay off their bicycles now until spring and summer.

The roads are usually wet and icy and strong winter gusts can blow a cyclist over. Even on a sidewalk a skid could easily result in a broken arm or leg. Cars cannot stop in as short a space as they normally can, he said. Snow storms cut down the visibility of both the cyclist and motorist and the skill normally acquired by most bicyclists cannot be used said Corporal Scott.

The most common bicycle-car accidents are those of the two wheelers running into the side of the larger vehicle. He said, most accidents result in damaged bikes, and bruises, cuts and broken bones to the youngsters.

"Accidents prevented by safety and common sense are intangible and will never be recorded even if hundreds of lives were at stake," summed up the corporal. "But this is better than the tragedies we would hear about. As I said before we have been very fortunate during the past couple of years."

Holiday Greenery

You may be able to gather all the yuletide greenery you need, without harm, by pruning the trees and shrubs around the house.

Holly, pine and hemlock can withstand heavy pruning. Every second and third branch of a pine, hemlock or spruce can be removed if the tree has not been thinned for some time. Some times a rather long in-

side branch of holly, fir or pine that does little for a tree's appearance can be removed.

Yew lends itself to artful decorations. Andromeda, magnolia, euonymus, pueraria, coloneaster, ivy, and abelia will provide a variety of Yule greens. Boxwood is excellent, but should be snipped gently.

Christmas time pruning, judiciously done, will improve the health and appearance of tree or shrub. Best time to gather greenery is when the temperature is above 40 degrees.
