Passengers Have Minor Injuries In Accident

Property damage totalled over a thousand dollars in three motor vehicle accidents during the week.

Six hundred of that was done when cars driven by Douglas Alexander Lock, 33 Edward St. and Bertie Haddock, 11 Elizabeth St., came together on Guelph St. near the Canadian Tire Store on Saturday.

Lock was driving east on Guelph in a 1962 Rambler and Haddock was pulling out of the Canadian Tire parking lot when the collision occurred. Lock applied his brakes at the John St. intersection but had total conditions made stopping all too impossible.

Two cars were parked on Guelph to the left of the intersection making it difficult for Haddock to see oncoming traffic.

Mrs. Lock and Suzanne Lock, passengers in Mr. Lock's car, suffered a bruised head and cut knee and scratches, respectively, and were attended by nurse at Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital.

The same day cars driven by William Rannachan, 29 Barstow Cres. and Jack Arthur Snyder, Newmarket, suffered \$200 damage each when they hit at the Guelph/Mountainview intersection.

Rannachan was proceeding west on Guelph and Snyder was southbound on Mountainview. The icy condition of the road at the Mountainview stop sign was blamed.

Mrs. Snyder, riding with her husband, injured her left ankle when the cars collided.

He returned to Georgetown seven years ago, where he lived at 6 Gibbons Place. He has been in failing health for five years but was able to work part-time for Delrex Drugs as a deliveryman.

He leaves his wife, Marian Jeanette Norman, four sons, John, James and Robert at home and Ronald, with the RCAF who will be leaving in January for service in Germany, a brother Ted of Downsview and seven brothers and sisters in England.

 - 1/2 pound of chicken (cut to 5 pounds)
 - 1 medium potato (about 1 pound), cubed
 - 1/2 cup carrots, cut in pieces
 - 1/2 cup flour
- In large heavy pan, combine soup, 1 cup water, celery, onion, and seasonings; add chicken. Cover; cook over low heat 1 1/2 hours, stirring now and then. Add potatoes and carrots. Cover; cook about 45 minutes or until chicken and vegetables are tender. To thicken stew, blend flour and remaining water; gradually stir into stew. Cook 10 to 15 minutes, stirring often. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Local Nurses Studying Professional Problems

Approximately 20 registered nurses, members of the Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital Staff, met with Halton Association of Registered Nurses president, Miss Betty Davidson recently to begin a study and define the broad term "What is Nursing?"

The nurses will follow this up with group meetings from time to time to continue the study and deal with existing problems within the nursing profession.

Miss Davidson pointed out that nursing stands at the "crossroads" and that the responsibility of the group is to study the needs of the profession and make a decision about the future of nursing.

She stressed that the public requires that this study be done. "What other group would be more qualified than nurses themselves?" she asked.

"Let us put nursing and its future in the hands of the nurses," she added.

She said there are 40,000 graduate nurses in the province. "With this strength, we wonder what results we could achieve."

She said that each nurse should study any new developments within the profession and later bring her observations to the meetings.

It is known that there has been increasing dissatisfaction among graduate nurses with a proposed plan to lower the educational standards required by the profession in an attempt to fill a mounting demand for nurses in the province.
