## Urge Care With Firearms After Hunting Accident

A hunting accident in which an 18 year old youth was shot while hunting with companions near here has prompted North Halton OPP to issue a stern warning urging more care with firearms.

The youth, Bruce McCauley of Oakville, was hunting on the 8th Line of Esquing with companions aged 15, 16 and 18 when a rabbit ran between them. The three friends all fired their rifles and McCauley was struck in the thigh. He was treated in hospital.

Section 18 of the Game and Fisheries Act provides for a fine up to \$1,000 or imprisonment for one year for hunting carelessly, police said.

The Act states "Every person is guilty of the offense of hunting carelessly who being in possession of an air-gun or firearm for the purpose of hunting, discharges or causes to discharge or handles such air-gun or firearm without due care and attention or without reasonable consideration for persons or property."
