

## Recommend Merger of Five Peel Police Departments

Chingacousy Police Department, which covers Terra Cotta, R.R. 4, Georgetown, the east half of Norval and Huttonville in this area, may become part of a Peel County Police Department, if recommended amalgamation becomes a fact.

The amalgamation of Peel's five police departments, Chingacousy, Brampton, Streetsville, Toronto Township and Port Credit was recommended by the Ontario Police Commission.

In a report to commission chairman Judge Bruce Macdonald, W. H. Clark, the commission's chief advisor on police services, urged the amalgamation.

In his report, Mr. Clark stated Chief Constable Gafnet McGill who heads Toronto Township's 88-man force, should head the new department.

### Better Policing

Mr. Clark stated the amalgamated force would give more efficient and better policing by providing better communications, supervision and trained personnel and a greater coordination of police effort.

At present the five municipalities have a total of 120 policemen, but three of the departments are not connected by radio and three do not have detective divisions.

The county asked the advice of the commission on the feasibility of establishing a county police force. In his report Mr. Clark stated that the creation of a county force could be considered subsequent to the amalgamation of the urban forces. He recommended that the three rural townships and two villages in the north end of the county continue to be policed by the Ontario Provincial Police.

### More Men

To police the rural area at present time would require hiring additional men and establishing them at strategic points in the north end, Mr. Clark's report stated.
