Yule Festivities Reflected in Hydro's "Magic Mirror"



Round-the-clock Yuletide festivities of some six million people as related to the use of electricity in southern and northeastern Ontario are reflected as if in a "magic mirror" in the room shown in this picture.

Located in Ontario Hydro's Robinson transformer station on Highway No. 27, northwest of Metropolitan Toronto, this room is virtually a key nerve centre in the Commission's East System power network. In this world of electronics, meters and switches, ever-vigilant supervisors, working in shifts, maintain a fully adequate supply of power to meet all demands at any hour of the day or night.

One of the meters under close observation mirrors a continuous record of the demand for 60-cycle power. As this record unfolds in graphic form, these experienced supervisors can readily interpret many of the essential roles electricity is playing in "life, living and the pursuit of happiness" at Christmas as compared with a normal working day. By "reading between the lines" on the graph, they can tell when mummy and daddy are up late Christmas Eve to give Santa an assist. They know when kiddies are playing with their toys and the folks are having late breakfast Christmas morning. Likewise, they can follow mother's progress as she prepares the turkey and all the trimmings. Among other things, they know also when the folks are having an afternoon nap and when they finally go to bed at night.
