

Display of Oil Paintings Delights Manor Residents

HOLIDAY STAINS NEED ATTENTION

Removing Christmas stains from fabrics, such as ink, candle wax, grease or chocolate, calls for prompt action. Carbon tetrachloride is best to remove ballpoint pen ink stains. Warm soap or detergent scrub. Wash and rinse in clear water. If discoloration remains on shirt or blouse, material use a mild bleach and launder again.

Scrape excess candle wax off garments with a table knife. Apply stain remover gently with eraser. Rinse thoroughly with warm water. For chocolate or cocoa stains, wash in hot suds. Treat remaining stain with weak solution of household bleach or hydrogen peroxide and launder again in hot suds.
