### "Red Knight's" Cousin Breeds Race Horses on Haltonville Farm

A few miles west of Georgetown in the small hamlet of Haltonville stands the Wolfhill Farm, the home of Wolfgang von Richtofen, first cousin to the famous Baron Manfred von Richtofen, who earned himself the nickname of the "Red Knight" during the first World War. The Red Knight was finally shot down by Captain Roy Brown a Canadian of the Royal Flying Corps but not before he established himself as the German pilot with the highest number of kills in the Luftwaffe. Captain Brown died of natural causes in Canada about four years ago. Twelve years ago Wolfgang von Richtofen came to Canada from Sillesia on the old Prus-Poland border. He dropped his title of Baron and has since adopted the name "Wolf" as his chosen name. His lands were confiscated by the Russians after the second World War. He was at the time the owner of three large castles and extensive land holdings.

Before the war he bred and raced standard bred horses for training and racing in what is now West Berlin. His name is still revered in German racing circles. With little money, but wide experience, he built his farm Wolfhill almost from scratch, intending to eventually return to his first love, the breeding of horses for the turf. His farm is the former home of Countess Olga, cousin of the assassinated Czar of Russia. He started his farm with a little later he and his wife, the great granddaughter of Prince Bismark of Prussia, bred and train them for turf. He turned his attention from standard-breds to thorough-breds and since that time he has turned out winners with an almost monotonous regularity. Mrs. von Richtofen took time out from farming to study as a lawyer and was admitted to the Canadian bar about 10 years ago.

When declarer sees dummy, he should stop and plan his play. He must lose at least one trick in each suit outside of trump. He cannot afford to lose any more. Therefore it must be assumed that East holds the diamond ace and West holds the club king. In a close contract always assume within reason that the cards are in the right position and play for them to be there. On this hand, the usual opening was the diamond jack. This solved the diamond problem, since the king was now a trick. East wins with the ace and his best play is to continue diamonds. South should take out trump and lead hearts. He wins one heart, loses one and ruffs the club king.
