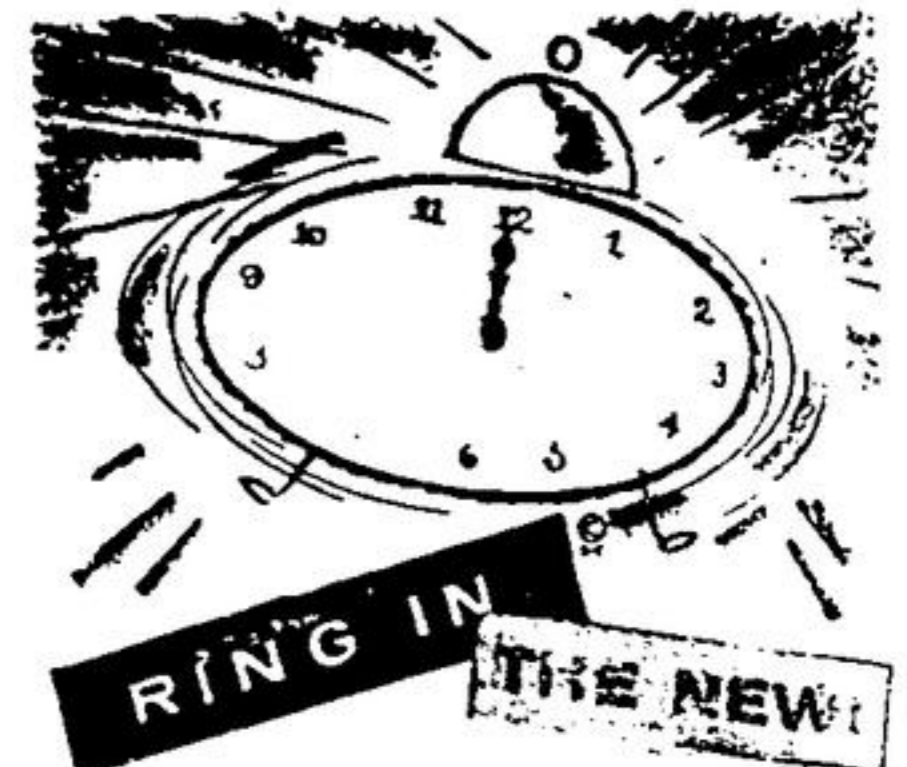
**Gift Made Possible**

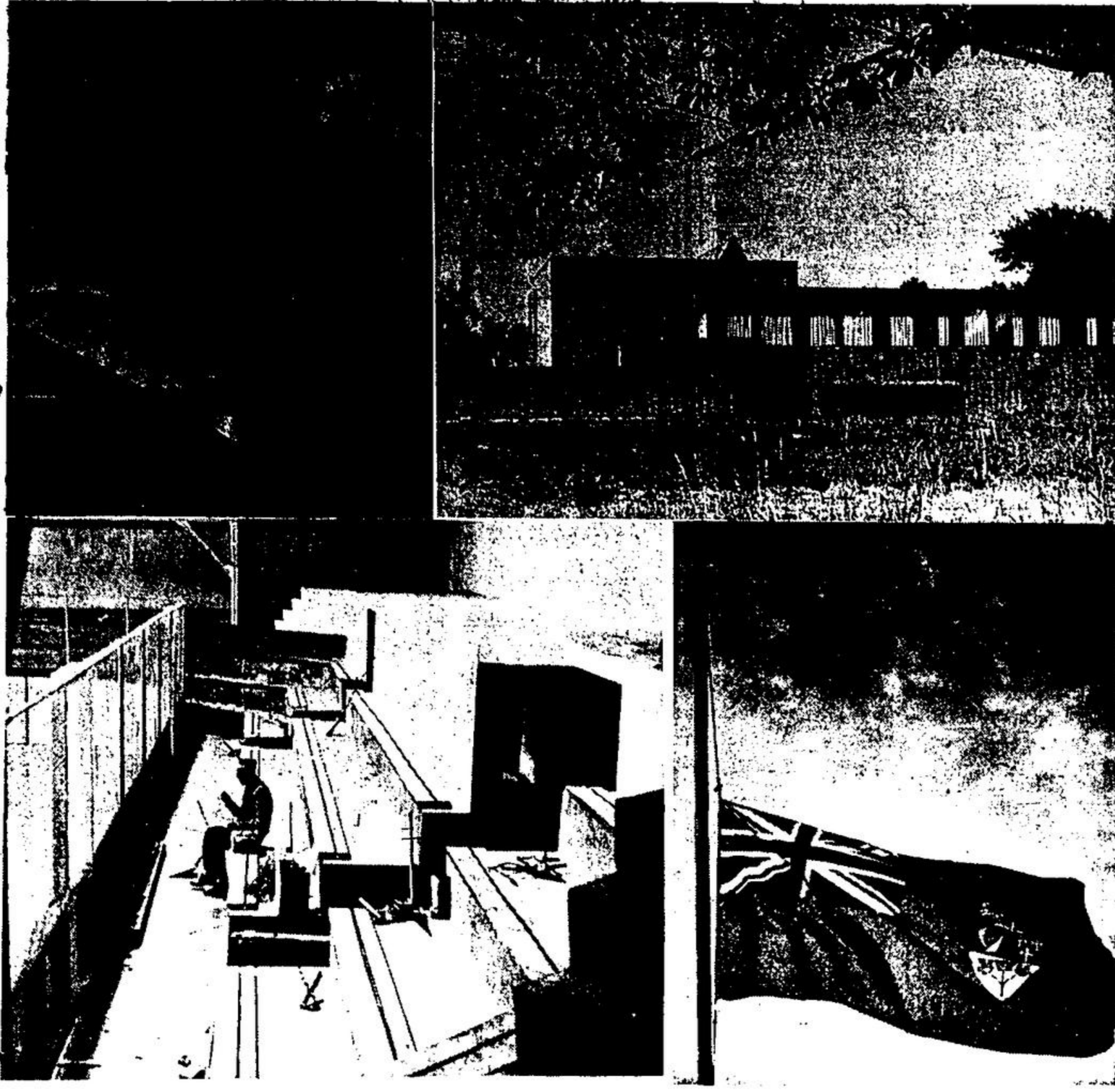
