Mental Cases No Longer Accepted In Patient's Interest - Says Board

At the final Board meeting of 1963, on the 19th of December, the Board of Directors was shown a film entitled "A Case of Understanding," dealing with the Medical Staff's responsibilities to the Community Hospital, before making some important decisions with regard to the Hospital operations and the Annual Meeting.

It was decided that in future the Hospital would accept for admission patients with mental disturbances only if they were also suffering from a physical condition. This decision was based on the Board's desire to provide the best possible care.

The hospital at present does not have the facilities to provide psychiatric care, as such, but the new wing of the Hampton Hospital has a fully staffed psychiatric unit, and it is hoped that it will be open to use by this hospital's patient population.

It was also decided, that in future, individuals or groups requesting patient record information for purposes of insurance, etc., would be charged a fee of at least \$3.00, to cover the cost of producing copies, etc.

The date for the Annual Meeting was set for March 12,

1964, which means that all Association Memberships must be purchased by February 11th, 1964. Any interested persons may purchase these from the Administrator's Office, Monday to Friday, between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

Following the meeting, the members and their wives and husbands adjourned to the home of the Administrator for refreshments and a social get-together.
