The decline in building locally is indicated in the figures revealed by the building inspector for 1963. The total value of building permits issued amounted to \$352,135.

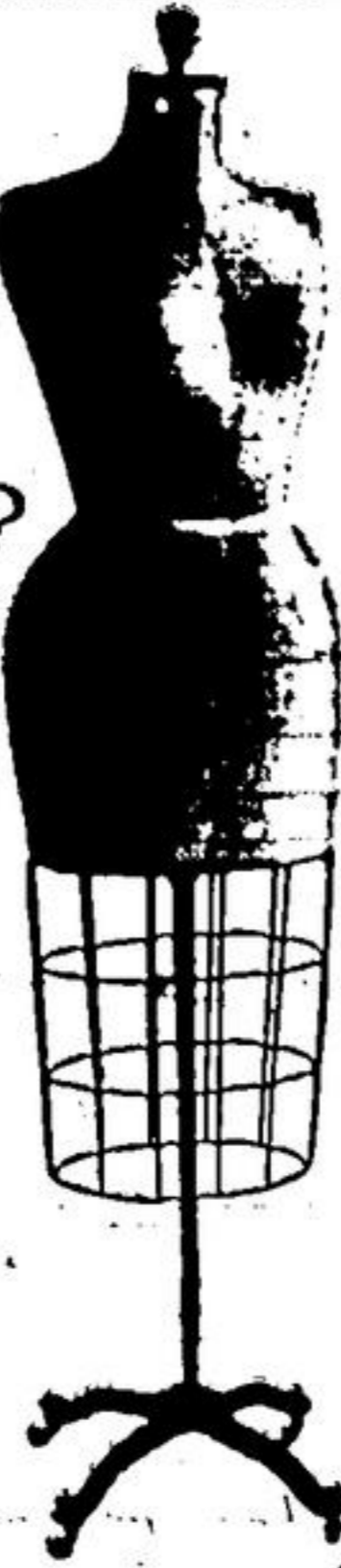

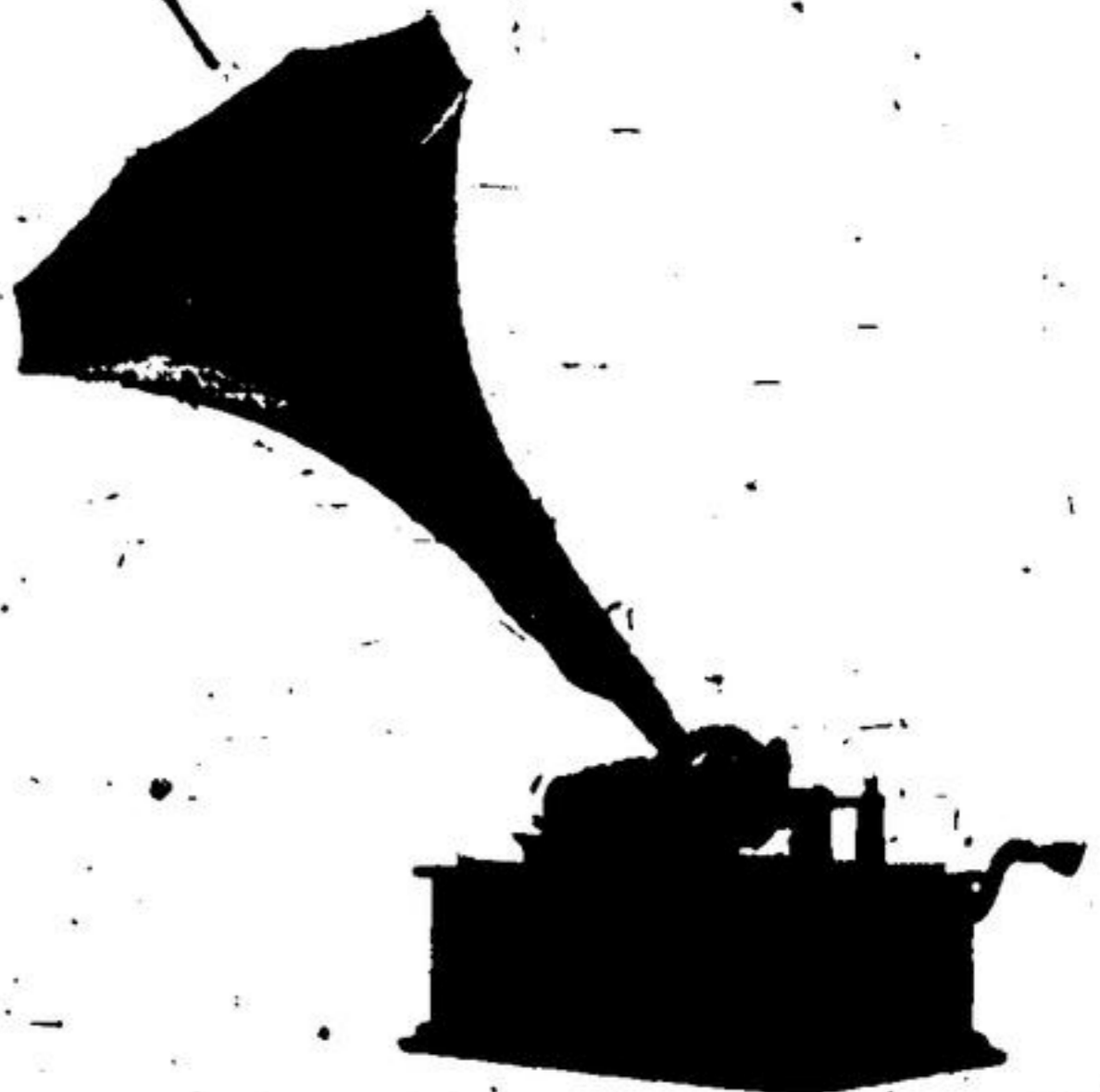
