## Sunday Sport Okay Spells Demise of Industrial Loop

Industrial hockey in Georgetown has been knocked dead by an ironic twist. Always able to operate Sunday afternoons prior to the Sunday sports by law because of their no-admission charge policy the Industrial League strangely became the innocent victim of the Sunday sports vote. When the by-law went into effect it meant the choice Sunday afternoon time slot protected by the industrial loop for the past ten years was suddenly sought after by the more cash-conscious clubs, Georgetown Raiders and the Junior B Beavers and both received shares of the remaining Sunday.

The remaining "open" Sundays are not numerous enough for the Industrial League to operate an afternoon league. The arena board offered a later start time, 5 o'clock, but a quick survey by Industrial League president Earl McPherson among the four teams involved drew a conclusive "can't make it then" from the majority. McPherson replied by letter that the 5 to 8 alternative didn't suit and the industrial set-up melted out of the hockey scene like the last puff of smoke from a snuffed out cigarette. A year the league was made up of four teams—none of them according to their labels, Georgetown clubs, although the fact is three of the teams Normal, Glen Williams and Halton NIP Players were heavily laced with town players. The other team, Oakville, of course, employed solely out-of-town personnel. The season started November 10th and ground to an early halt December 20th when the final games were played. Eight Sundays and sixteen industrial league games. Unofficially Glen Williams gets whatever belongs to Industrial League champs. They were at the top when the end came.
