FIRST CANUCK WINTER

Town's Americans Amazed at Snowfall

Natives of the U.S. of A. experiencing their first taste of Canada's annual retrogression to the ice age as Georgetown residents, generally commented favourably when asked for comparisons by The Herald this week.

"The major difference according to those polled, is the amount of snow here — the cold was secondary."

Mrs. J. Kliffner, 11 Delores Blvd. who came here this summer, says both she and her husband, Rev. Kliffner, of the Lutheran Church, like the winter here, although she has never lived in the north.

"We love to be in the snow," she told The Herald, "but I don't imagine those people who have to commute to Toronto are thrilled about it."

Mrs. Earl Yobe, 101 Sargent Road, whose home state is Mississippi, commented: "I don't find it any colder than Mississippi in winter — but there is not the dampness here we've been used to."

Mrs. Yobe said that although the mercury dives as low as times in old Miss. it doesn't stay there as long. We get cold snaps lasting five or six days, whereas the temperature would stay there for two weeks.

"The school's have a year and a half old son who, though he can't compare a southern Ontario winter with a southern U.S. one, can certainly show his love with the deep snow."

"We love to get out in it," she said Mrs. Yobe. Roy Kopp, plant manager at Pressite on Armstrong Ave. although he isn't an American

came here this summer after there was about the same. But the over-all climate is quite different. "The children didn't have to wear boots to school twice last year," she said, explaining the difference. "They could walk outside like on a spring day."

She said the cherry blossoms were in bloom in March, and late summer here was a treat. "In Maryland, where we lived before moving here, the summer was not as pleasant."

Donald Knudson, 71 Duncan St., said the humidity here is about on par with his home state of Illinois. Mr. Knudson, a Massachusetts native, moved here this week, so was unable to make a comparison of winter here with his native New England.

"You have more snow here at the moment it's milder than Illinois," he said.
