### Surplus or Deficit? Await 1963 Figures

Whether Georgetown ended 1963 with a surplus as forecast or a deficit will not be determined until year-end records are completed sometime in the next month.

At council meeting last Wednesday, Mayor Gibbons questioned auditor Walter H. Pope on payment of the 1963 county rate which has been deferred until January.

"The expenditure, he was assured, was accounted for in the 1963 records, but payment was deferred so the borrowing allowance of 70% of taxes allowed by the Municipal Act.

Last year the county rate, estimated by the town when its budget was struck, was actually fixed at a mill above the estimate.

"Wouldn't this mean a three or four thousand deficit rather than the \$1800 surplus forecast?" asked the mayor.

"I can't comment until final figures are all in" said Mr. Pope.

But Cr. Don Powers added that the extra levy was included in the interim statement which shows the \$1800. estimated surplus.

### Mayor Wins, Won't Budget \$2,500 for Allowance

The \$2500. expense allowance which Mayor Joseph Gibbons is declining this year, caused a spirited discussion Monday when a Hildebrandt-Elliott motion to set it at the usual figure was tabled.

Cr. Hildebrandt explained that it was not his intention to cause a controversy.

"I believe the office should be entitled to this, and if it is your choice to turn it back to the town, it is appreciated," he said. "However, other mayoral candidates may want to take on the job with only pay and this could be an embarrassment in future."

He also pointed out that should, for some reason, Mr. Gibbons be replaced during his term of office, his successor would be unable to be paid without such a motion on the books.

Cr. Don Powers argued that the \$2500. should be in the budget whether the cheque is issued or not.

"That's one of the scrawny statements I've heard" snapped the mayor. "You want to put it in the budget knowing that it won't be spent."

Mayor Gibbons then reiterated that he will accept no salary this year.

"I've never been coaxed so much to take money" he said. "I'm certainly opposed to budgeting for something which won't be spent. It's been suggested that I take the money and give it to my favourite charity. Perhaps I'd improve my political position by doing this, but I would certainly not be helping the town."

### Car Plus Uneducated Teens Equal Delinquency

At George Kennedy Home & School Association meeting last Wednesday night, Magistrate Langdon, discarding his prepared text, launched into an off the cuff discussion on "Our delinquent or deficient parents."

Between ten and fifteen thousand people a year appear in magistrate's court and between five hundred and one thousand in juvenile court. His greatest concern is with the juveniles, whose problems are usually traceable to the delinquent parent, according to the magistrate.

Youngsters being permitted to marry and bring children into the world when the parents themselves are children is a main cause of misery, he contended. This is a result of children being allowed to date and stay out late when they are far too young. "I'm helpless," admitted the magistrate. "There is no way I can refuse to marry them."

He cited as a further example of lack of parental supervision, unmarried mothers as young as fourteen.

The automobile and the sixteen year old do not mix, said Mr. Langdon, as he advocated at least eighteen as the minimum age for a driving license. "Their reflexes may be fine but they have no sense of responsibility."

Part of the indifference to mastering an education can be laid at the door of the automobile also; maintained the speaker. The lack of education causes the next trouble — money. "A big part of the break down of marriage is caused by money, or more exactly, the inability to budget," he continued. Examples of families borrowing from four sources at one time were common.

### Being a second class citizen, he would be deprived of certain rights, such as the right to drive or own a car, or right to marry, the right to buy alcohol, or the right to vote.

Upon graduation from whatever form of learning to an independent adult, a citizenship award would be given, entitling him to all the privileges denied while a dependent.

In conclusion he suggested the churches could "win back the respect and recognition they have lost" by training young people for marriage and child raising.

In thanking the speaker, President Merv Lovell stated, "if that is an example of an 'off the cuff' speech, I wonder what magistrate Langdon could do with a prepared one."
