

SPORTSMEN OUTDOORS

- Ice fishing seems to be a little slow this year, as yet, I have heard of no good catches. On three different trips to the Huntsville area, local sportsmen had two small perch to show for their trouble.
- Rabbit hunting has shown better results for time spent in the outdoors.
- For the benefit of hunters, especially the younger ones and those new to this sport, I pass on some general information.
- A hunting licence may be obtained from a licence issuer by one of the following methods: (1) By presenting a previous hunting licence; (2) By signing a form, 14 to the effect that the applicant has held a previous hunting licence but have lost or misplaced it; (3) By presenting a competence card that has been obtained by passing a Hunter Safety course.
- The minimum age limit for the holder of a hunting licence is fifteen (15) years old. There are several townships in the adjoining counties that have special by-laws regulating the discharge of firearms, so check with the township clerks for up-to-date information on these by-laws.
- Hunting and trapping is prohibited in Crown Game Reserves.
- A rifle of greater calibre than .226 is not to be carried or discharged in the Lake Huron district with the exception of Bruce and Grey counties.
- It is illegal to use ferrets to hunt game.
- Hunting parties are restricted to twelve (12) hunters or less.
- Loaded firearms in a motor vehicle and hunting at night are serious offences and convictions on these counts bring heavy fines and the seized firearms are seldom returned.
- These are but a few of the regulations. For further information a copy of the Game and Fish Act may be obtained by writing to the Department of Lands and Forests, Fish and Wildlife Branch, Parliament Buildings, Toronto, Ont.
- Hunting European Hare — (Jack-rabbit) with a half dozen or less can produce good results if property organized. The hunters should be well spread out and in the form of a V, with the outside men well ahead of the others. Don't overdo either shot, long range loads, long barrels and full choke. Jack-rabbits are tough and taking shots out of range just produces cripples, suffering and a waste of game and shells.
- Try shooting Jack-rabbits in a mixture of salt and vinegar and then make them into stew with carrots and of meat, or grind the meat along with some bacon and make Jackburgers.
- The hunters that hunt Jacks, do so in many ways, some like to hunt with shot guns and drive a block, others use rifles of many calibres and in some instances, some of the hunters like to pit their skills against this fast running animal with firearms that were used by our ancestors. Some hunters like to use a cap and ball rifle or for an old market for hunting.
- These men take great pride in their firearms as they keep them in the best of shape polished till they look like new, not one that is a century old. Loaded up with black powder, ball or shot, with a cap unbroken, the firing pin they start out across the fields.
- These guns are very accurate at close ranges and many hunters are proud to carry and use these old timers even though it takes a while for the smoke to clear each time it is fired and also the inconvenience of the reloading.
- WHAT TO HUNY COTTONTAIL RABBITS are increasing the last two years and may be found in reasonable numbers in the surrounding areas. The heaviest population may well be found close to the shore line of Georgian Bay.
- VARYING HARE (Snow Shoe rabbit) are abundant in bushy areas all nearby townships.
- WOLVES (bush wolves) are at present found in some areas, with 5 wolves shot this fall, in three townships. The wolves should provide excellent hunting for the enthusiastic wolf hunter.
- PORCOS: are coming back strongly in all areas, a huntable population now exists.
