

# Raiders Tuck Away Two Township Won't Participate in Supplying Town With Water

Eight Sunday and another Monday. The customers saw 9 goals in a wide open first period on Sunday, 7 by Georgetown and 2 by Elora. It was 9-3 at the end of two hours.

Reeve G. Leslie made it clear, Monday night, that Esquesing Township has no intention of getting into the water business, when Mr. J. Morrison sought township help in financing water lines to a proposed subdivision on the old Cromar farm on Main Street South.

Mr. Morrison explained that Georgetown was willing to see him water, but he had to run the lines to join with existing mains. Reeve Leslie pointed out that anyone in the township serviced by town lines and town water had negotiated the deal themselves, with the township having nothing to do with it.

The subdivider suggested that the province, through the Ontario Water Resources Commission might help finance it, and be repaid over twenty years. "I plan to put expensive houses there," claimed Mr. Morrison.

"As soon as you do," retorted Councillor G. Currie, "Georgetown will try to annex it. The province consented to make enquiries from the Water Resources Commission, on Mr. Morrison's behalf, but emphasized that the township would not be involved in any way."

Three members of the Esquesing School Board, Russell Miller, Lloyd Fisher and Charles Early, met with Council to discuss the renting of the downstairs room as an office. Mr. HILLEY has been discussed with last year's Board, but no agreement had been drawn.

A rent of \$500 a year, including lights and heat, was agreed upon, with an option for another five years. If, at the end of one year, the township needs the space, they may terminate the agreement by refunding half of the rent already paid.

To illustrate a council complaint about a noisy fan installed by the Board downstairs, Clerk K. C. Lindsay went down and turned it on, then no one could hear. The School Board members immediately suggested a smaller motor be used.

Council authorized a \$200 increase to J. McDonald for the use of his land for a township dump. The rate will now be \$500 a year, instead of the previous \$300.

Mr. J. Morrison complained about a hedge extending on to town property on No. 27 Sideroad outside of Acton, blocking the view. He also suggested a "Stop" sign where No. 27 Sideroad meets the first line.

Council decided to go up and look over the property.

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## One Delrex Assessment is Reduced, and One Upheld

Appealing to the county judge from a revision court decision, Delrex Developments has had its assessment reduced on a number of building lots on undeveloped land by \$100 per foot frontage.

The judge last week reduced the revision court's figure of \$500 to \$400.

A second appeal, which claimed a \$200 to \$300 per acre assessment on 613 acres which the company claims is farm land is too high, was disallowed by the judge. The land is an undeveloped portion of the Delrex subdivision.

## Honourable Mention County Firefighters

Awards for outstanding fire prevention programs were announced today for four fire prevention agencies in Halton County. All were winners of major awards and certificates in the annual International contest conducted by the National Fire Protection Association of Boston, Mass.

Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau, a group embracing members of all five fire departments in the county, received a "special recognition" for an outstanding county-sponsored fire prevention program. Two other Ontario counties received similar awards.

Oakville Fire Department received an "honorable mention" in the Class B Canadian municipal division, for communities with a population of 25,000 to 99,000. The Milton Fire Department won an "honorable mention" in the 5,000 to 9,000 Class D contest. There were 511 Canadian communities competing in this division, 84 of them from Ontario.

All entries were scrapbook records of the various fire prevention groups' efforts during the past year. Certificates recognizing the winners will be presented to Halton Fire Prevention Bureau chairman Chief Erwin Lewis of Georgetown, Oakville Fire Chief Douglas Wilson, and Milton Fire Chief A. E. Clement, at the annual spring banquet of the Halton County Mutual Aid Fire Services Association.
