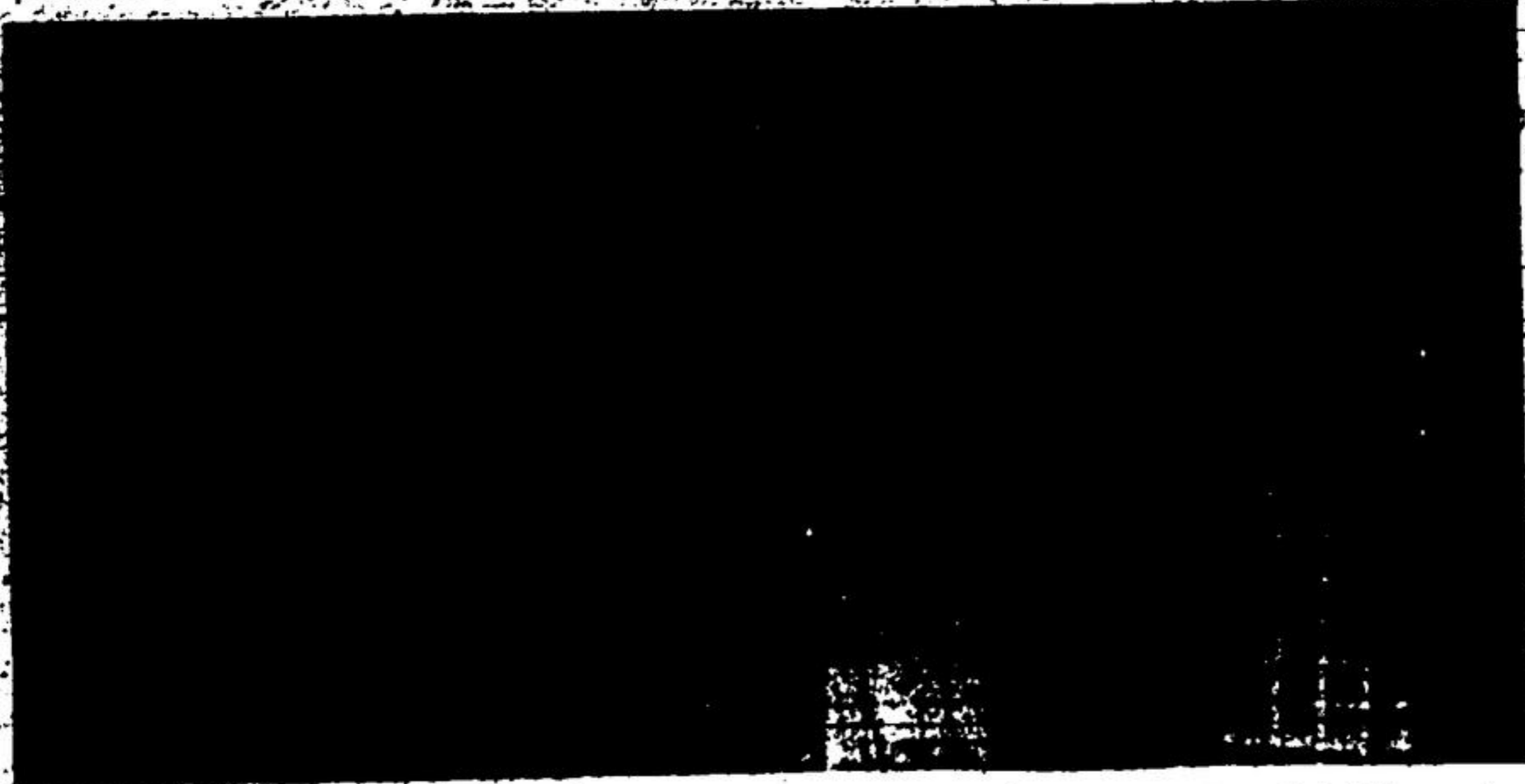


END OF A PROJECT

Decries Opponents Who Reversed P.O. Decision

Dear Sir,

Today, Monday, January 27, 1964, the Town of Georgetown through its municipal council, gave final approval to a reversal of a transaction which had been allowed to stand, had given Georgetown a town hall.

Today, the former Post Office building on Mill St. which the town had the good fortune to buy for \$18,000.00 was sold to private interests. The selling price: \$18,000.00.

Council, by this action, displayed a shocking lack of business sense and it may be indicated, to briefly review here some of the underlying facts of this move:

Last summer, the federal government, through one of its own agencies, made the old Post Office building available to the town for the consideration of the low purchase price of \$18,000.00.

Located at the bottom of Mill St., adjacent to the Hydro building and bordering to the downtown parking lot, the former Post Office occupies an admirable site for a town hall. Adding to this the fine appearance of this stately stone structure as well as the roomy interior which can be taken over for municipal office purposes almost without any alterations at all, the offer to purchase could not very well be passed up.

Nor was it the building was bought after selling the present Main St. structure.

Opponents to this move have charged that the price negotiated for the Main St. building is too low. It is, and everyone seems agreed on this point. The best price obtainable for the Main Street building was \$32,500.00. But because it was the best price obtainable, it is probably the building is worth and because the former Post Office is in every respect so far superior, the acceptance of \$32,500.00 was certainly justified.

Now, if \$32,500.00 is taken in and \$18,000.00 to be spent, there remains a balance of \$17,500.00 which could be spent on renovations of the former Post Office which then would give Georgetown the nucleus of a true civic center, a building large enough to serve this community through years of expansion and not a penny would come out of the taxpayers' money.

Today, the Town of Georgetown, through its municipal council, has decided otherwise. Today, a slim majority of this council has decided to keep a municipal building that may very well have been antiquated the day it was built.

The future, will be the judge.

Plentiful Publicity Pieces Aid County Fire Prevention

Georgetown Fire Chief Erwin Lewis told members of the Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau that the association fired 153,000 paper bullets, posters and other pieces of literature in their annual campaign to raise fire hazards in 1963.

He said the ocean of fire prevention reminders included 30,000 spring cleanup posters, 40,000 pieces on planning escapes, 6,000 poster contest entries, 50,000 restaurant place mats, 20,000 Christmas tree tags, 6,500 fire department emergency number stickers and fire door warning signs, and 500 Christmas posters for churches and public buildings.

He also stated in his report: "An average attendance of 10 men from the five fire departments in Halton County attended our meetings, giving of their time, experience and efforts to better our fire prevention and safety in Halton County."

"The fire inspection blitz was postponed for this year, due to the yearly inspections regularly carried out in the towns concerned. It did not halt the efforts through schools, stores and open fire halls, when equipment and fire prevention were demonstrated. Our church parade in Burlington was a huge success."

"A poster drawing contest was held for all Grade Five pupils who drew causes and prevention of home fires. Approximately 500 children participated and two winners were chosen for the County. The girl was Brenda Mitchell of the Strathcona School, Burlington, and the boy was Jeffery Forman of E. J. James School in Oakville."

"On November 26 a banquet was held in their honor and each child received a thank you certificate for their participation in a challenge trophy was presented to representatives of their schools. Their winning posters will be entered in an all-Ontario contest, which is sponsored by the Ontario Fire Chiefs' Association."

"Our colored slides on fire prevention were shown to other fire departments and local groups. We had requests for copies of our place mats and Christmas tree tags from as far away as Cardington, Ohio. During the year the Bureau purchased a color film. A duplicating machine and more printing supplies were also purchased for the public relations officer."

"October was a busy time for grass and bush fires, due to the dry weather. All departments were kept very busy. We had our County Warden declare a state of emergency. Our public relations officer compiled a scrapbook on the year's activities, one and a half times as large as last year's. This was entered in the National Fire Prevention Association contest, but to date we have no report on its success. He also kept the press informed on the Bureau's activities."
