Some of the expenses left to the board could be erased if service clubs took up the torch and made it one of their projects. A little more could be eliminated if garage operators expressed their approval by donating oil and gas for the instructional car or even provide housing. The AVC is willing and expects to, shoulder some cost if the cost is added, but not a figure as close to the thousand dollar mark as their first rough calculation produced.

Finding a volunteer or volunteers to handle the instruction doesn't appear quite as hopeless as if the selection were limited to the high school staff. Edwards taught out that public school teachers and police officers are also employed, by some high schools for the after-school hours course.

Edwards recommended a class of 20 to 30. He said the students would receive 25 hours of classroom instruction, 18 of in-car observing while another student drives, and 8 hours of behind the wheel training. As well as knowing cars in-

struction personnel — the Dept. of Transport will provide all expense paid two-week summer courses for teachers who want to teach Driver Training, but the AVC doesn't expect teachers will be breaking the door down to apply. The course is an extra-curricular activity and the teaching staff is already burdened with drama work, sports and dozens of other after school projects as well as work preparation and exam marking.

Taking on Driver Training would mean giving up another five hours weekly, and even though the extra pay is attractive no is spare time. Some of the course would even mean sacrificing some weekend time.

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Then their questioning brought out the snags. Cost — Pupil enrolment will be expected to pay an enrolment fee in the neighbourhood of \$15; cars, dual controls, text books, films and other training aids will be supplied by a car manufacturer and the Dept. of Transport and a government grant will further reduce expense — but the board will still be faced with paying out something like \$300 per course, most of it in instruction salaries.
