She is a trained potter and silversmith and an accomplished maker of batiks, a beautiful, many century old Japanese art which is still practiced today in its original form. She came to Canada in 1963 and exhibited her batiks at the North York Public Library in Toronto.

Gallery House Sol has arranged a tight schedule of exhibitions for the next half year which is as follows: February 29 - March 18: the outstanding graphic artist Kolf Meyn will show watercolours, drawings, woodcuts and etchings. March 21 - April 8: Paul Buchanan, who had a successful one-man show last fall at House Sol, will exhibit new religious paintings.

April 11 - April 27: Georgetown's Dorothy Stone will have a show with new oils, done during the last year. May 2 - May 18: House Sol will have again the good fortune to exhibit drawings by the great Josef Drehters and at the same time, small sculptures in silver by Harold Muller.

May 23 - June 7: House Sol branches out in a new direction by exhibiting artistic photographs by four young photographers. June 13 - July 6: the gallery plans a group show, with new works by its 18 artists. In addition to all that there will again, as in 1963, be an outdoor sculpture show in the galleries garden from May 23-July 6, in which some of Canada's leading sculptors will take part.
