Local Motorist Quoted In Automobile Bulletin

Motoring Memories of the Good Old Days, a feature column in the Hamilton Automobile Club's monthly publication H.A.C. News, contained some reminiscing by a Georgetown man last month.

Another "old-time" motorist and an H.A.C. member is Charles R. Wray of Georgetown, Ont., who obtained his first chauffeur's licence in 1918 and has never had a traffic violation conviction. Writing to the Club he recalls:

"At that time I was driving for J. H. Robinson Funeral Directors in Hamilton; and I had many hair-raising experiences. Once coming down the old Jolley Cut from the James Street Incline, the horses slid down backwards until I reached John Street. Another time a tire blew just as I reached the cemetery gate and I had to ride flat to the grave site."

He reveals that his brother, R. H. Wray, with Wallace Funeral Directors on Ottawa St. North, Hamilton, has been driving since 1919, and has also never had a conviction for traffic violation. Mr. Wray's present hearse was purchased in 1965 and has 136,000 miles on it.

"I hope to keep my licence until I reach the 150,000 mile mark," he says. "As for driving, I consider it to be a privilege which should never be abused."
