**MINISTER MAKES IT OFFICIAL**

cation in Esquevas Township. The guest speaker's message dwelt mainly with the interesting history of the township and some of the people connected with the education of its citizens.

**MILLION DOLLAR PROJECT**

**Second Home For Aged Start Building This Spring**

The new 150 bed home for the aged adjacent to the present Centennial Manor, will be started this year instead of in 1965. It was revealed at Halton County Council last week. The stepped up programme was disclosed in an application for a \$250,000. municipal works assistance loan to help finance the estimated one million dollar cost. Immediate plans call for a 150 bed home, with the addition of further 150 beds provided at a later date. The new three storey home provides for approximately 50 beds on each floor with a special care patients on the main floor, and bed care on the second and third floor levels. Two elevators are included in the plans.

A considerable saving will be effected by the common use of laundry, chapel and auditorium facilities in the present building, which will be connected to the new building by an underground passage. In addition the use of the existing site will cut the overall costs greatly. A salary by law seven pages long listing 202 County employees, and totalling over \$700,000. yearly, was approved by Halton County Council last week. While all the other salary increases passed quietly, a wrangle ensued over the salary of E.M.O. co-ordinator Bruce McGregor. \$6,750., an increase of \$250. was recommended by the E.M.O. Committee, headed by Reeve H. Hinton of Acton,

but was opposed by Reeve J. Elliott of Georgetown, chairman of the Personnel and Office Administration Committee. "The Personnel Committee overrules any other on this issue," contended Reeve Elliott. "All other committees merely recommend salaries to the Personnel Committee," he maintained. Obviously Council agreed with Reeve Elliott and voted to refuse the salary increase. Included in the salary by-laws were staff members of the County Building, Centennial Manor, Health Unit, jail maintenance staff and roads department. Highest paid county employee is Dr. A. F. Bull, Medical Health Officer, at \$12,305., followed by clerk administrator G. Brown, at \$8,800.

While hunting accidents involving guns have declined in Ontario since 1960, the number of accidents in 1962 was 128. Alert handling of firearms is still very much a need.

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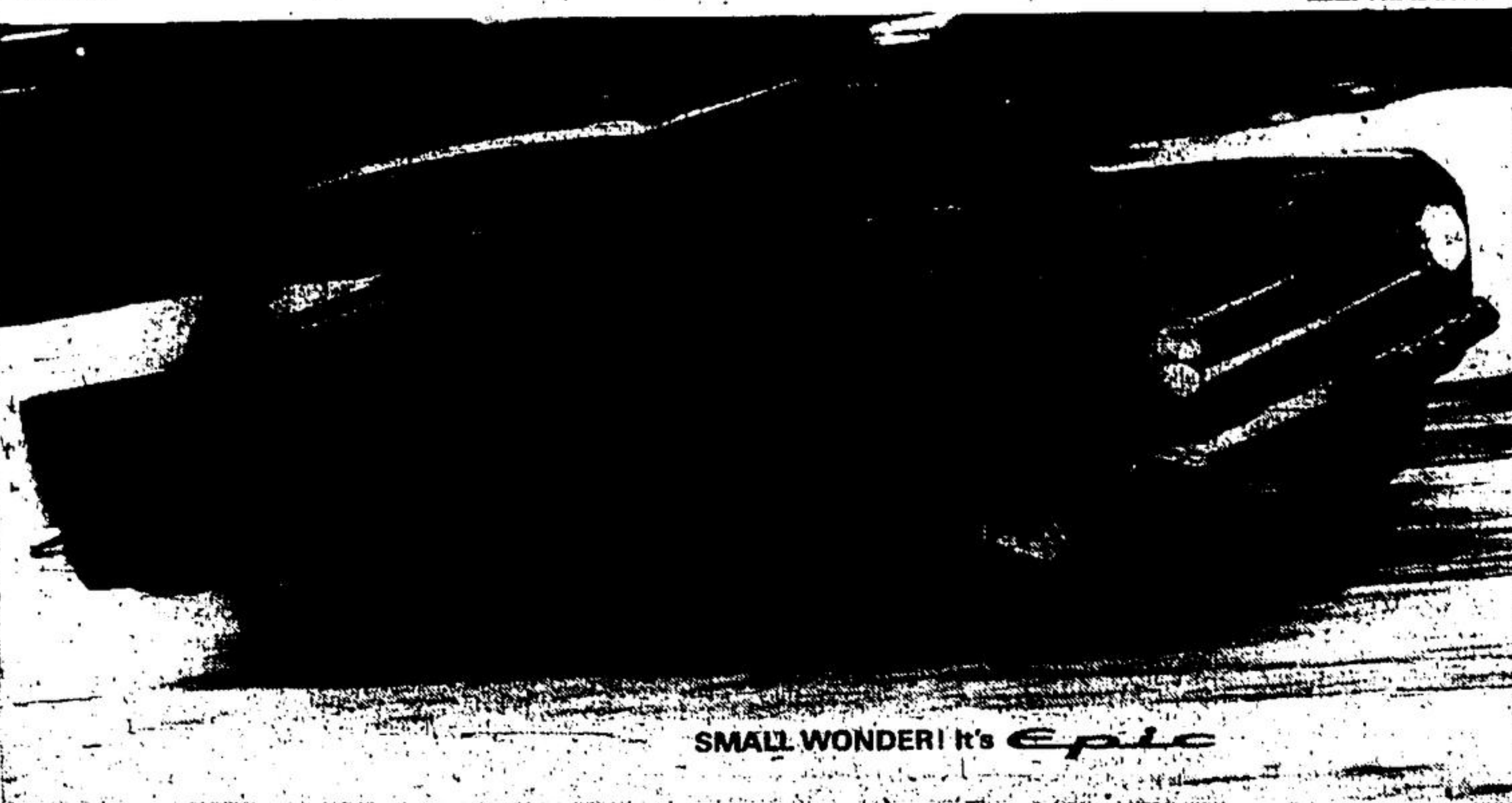
