Midgets Win Tri-County Advance to the Playoffs

The defending Ontario A Minor Midget champions, the Georgetown Midgets, have won their group championship and will begin climbing the ladder of Ontario Midget play-offs as soon as their first opposition is declared.

The locals won the Tri-County A Minor title Thursday night, handling Preston 7-1 to win the best of three group final in two straight games. They copped the opener in Preston by 5 goals to 2.

The Tri-County A Minor Midget trophy emblematic of the group crown was presented to Georgetown captain and scoring leader Jan Popell at the end of the second game.

Popell and Simon Ellwell each scored twice and Dave Sheppard, Terry Hay and Marty Wheeler scored single. Popell also collected four assists and Billy Dwyer three.

To keep sharp while marking time the Georgetown team plays exhibition games with Grimsby Monday and Trenton Thursday. The first test in Ontario competition will likely take place Feb. 15th.

Their chances of repeating last year's glittering effort and going all the way? — excellent according to one of the club officials who said this year's team in his opinion is even stronger than the one last season from which the NHL drafted an unprecedented five players.

Last season it was the MLD

get team that lighted a fire under the indifferent Georgetown sporting public and pulled crowds of over a thousand into the arena confines for the first time in years.

Last season climaxed with 1100 delirious fans cheering the Ontario champs after they disposed of Orillia here in overtime.

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Heart Attack Unlikely Here Among Minor League Players

Chances of a boy playing in the Georgetown Minor Hockey League suffering a heart attack are "very slim" according to Dr. C. A. Thompson, vice-president of the Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital's Medical Staff Association.

Dr. Thompson made the comment after a 16-year-old Toronto boy, Randolph Wayne Demchuck, died of a heart attack during a league game there last Saturday.

Dr. Thompson pointed out that all boys playing in the Georgetown Minor Hockey League underwent a physical check-up when they started public school and older boys were checked again when they started high school.

"Detectable defects would have been noted then," he told The Herald, "and parents would have been notified."

The dead boy however, suffered an ailment that would be almost impossible to detect in a routine examination. His arteries had failed to grow up with his body, and an autopsy attributed coronary thrombosis to malformation of the coronary artery.

He collapsed after coming off the ice in a league game in Kitchener. He had been playing hockey for several years but this was his first game in an organized league.

SPORTSMEN OUTDOORS

The Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters, who are recognized as the "voice" of the organized sportsmen, are greatly concerned about the replacing of the Marine Railway at Severn Falls and Swift Rapids, Severn River, on the Trent-Severn Waterway, with a pair of 14K locks, one of which has already been constructed.

They are concerned about the possibility of irreparable damage to the sports fishery presently existing in the waters connected with the Trent-Severn Waterway, in particular Lakes Simcoe, Couchiching, and Sparrow. This damage could arise through the introduction of coarse fish species and the parasitic Sea Lamprey. Such introduction would be facilitated by the proposed locks, which would allow unrestricted passage of all forms of marine life from Lake Huron.

They acknowledged the importance to the economy of the Province and to this area in particular, through tourism and the potential of the increase in marine traffic over this or any other waterway.

They maintain though, the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters are protesting the advisability of allowing the waterway system to be reduced or destroyed and the recreation of thousands ruined, through the construction of locks at these two designated spots, to satisfy a minority group of owners of large boats.

The three lakes mentioned earlier are said to be the most heavily fished of all Ontario's inland lakes. It is estimated that an average of 2,700 people are fishing lakes every day for nine and a half months of the year. Each fisherman spends an average of \$7.35 per day. This works out to a total of \$5,833,250.00 and does not include cost of boats and motors, used while enjoying this pastime.

Much of this revenue would disappear if the fish population of these three lakes were depleted. We have already seen the drastic results in Rossport, Meaford, etc., where lamprey have ruined the fishing. What additional revenue can we logically anticipate by replacing the marine railway with locks rather than a modern efficient marine railway?

In view of the fact that marine railways are the only factor in the size of the boats that can navigate the Severn
