**Education Minister Officiates as Pineview School is Dedicated**

The era of the one-room country school has ended in Esqueping Township. Completing a trend which started with a 3-room school at Glen Williams, the new 5-room Pineview School had its official opening January 29th. To impress the importance of the day, Hon. William Davis, provincial minister of education, was guest speaker.

Mr. Davis had gone to some pains to localize his remarks. He had delved into township history to recall early settlers, the birth of education and recollections of past inspectors. "Rural central schools are one of the most encouraging developments in education," he said. He cited higher professional qualifications in teachers, more specialized instruction and the challenge to pupils in larger numbers of their own age group as main advantages.

Mr. Davis was introduced by Mac Sprout, vice-chairman of the school board. Board chairman Mrs. Shirley Armstrong welcomed a crowd of over 400 which jammed the school for the ceremony. She stressed that education is a combination of school and home must share and that parents must provide the proper atmosphere to complement school instruction.

Rev. John C. Hill, minister of United Churches at Ashgrove, and Horby stressed that the school must be an instrument of God's truth and that knowledge in itself does not create an educated man; wisdom is the second essential ingredient. Mr. Hill dedicated the building.

**Recover Stolen Watch Seven Months Later**

Don't stop hoping. That's the message of a story that ended in high school board secretary Erv Forgrave's office on Monday when Georgetown Police Department Sgt. Evan Rollins walked in to place a wrist watch on his desk.

The watch had been away from its owner for 7 months. Mr. Forgrave gave the watch to his son Peter as an early graduation gift in February of last year. In July, Peter was at a park on 400 Highway where the watch was stolen. The theft was reported to Chief R. Halsey of the Georgetown Police Department who advised it also be reported to the Provincial Police at Port Credit which he did with a description of the watch.

The Port Credit Police passed the information on to the Vaughan Township Police, who probably advanced it further. A few days ago a man was picked up by Toronto Police wearing a wrist watch inscribed to Peter from Dad. They checked with area departments to see if such had been reported.

It was passed down the line of departments to the Georgetown Police who delivered it to Mr. Forgrave — as they say in the commercial — still running perfectly.

**Careers Preview Extended Boys Too Are Included**

A unique program initiated here by the Georgetown Business and Professional Women's Club to bring to the attention of the 350 GHS girls the many careers available to them has been expanded this year.

Because of the response to the program, which basically was having five career people address an assembly of high school girls and then answer questions in a follow-up session, the Georgetown B & P were asked if a similar program could be put together for the boys.

The Junior Chamber was responsive when the women suggested them as the likely organization to handle the male end of it. Consequently the entire student body will hear speakers next Wednesday at the second annual Careers Preview at GHS.

Bill English of the Jaycees lined up the five speakers who will address the boys. The representatives will be from Trans Canada Air Lines, the Bell Telephone Company, The Department of Labour, Varian Associates and a Georgetown lawyer, Fred Helson, will speak on the legal profession.

Girls will hear six speakers on: Occupational Therapy, Women in Insurance, Banking, careers for women in the Bell Telephone Company and Interior Design.

Each speaker will address their audience for ten minutes on the stage. At the end of the series of speeches, questions and answer sessions will be held in separate classrooms. Miss Jean Mackenzie of the Georgetown Business and Professional Women's Club will act as chairman of the girls' program.

Probably the most remarkable thing about Careers Preview is the willingness of the career representatives to accept a chance to address an audience of high school students. All have busy daily schedules to keep and yet none of the 11 indicated reluctance when asked to take part.

Whether or not their attempts to guide students into their proper niches holds any sway with the students in their eventual choice of careers will probably never be known, except to the scholars themselves.
