The boys will cook a meal in front of their canvas village.

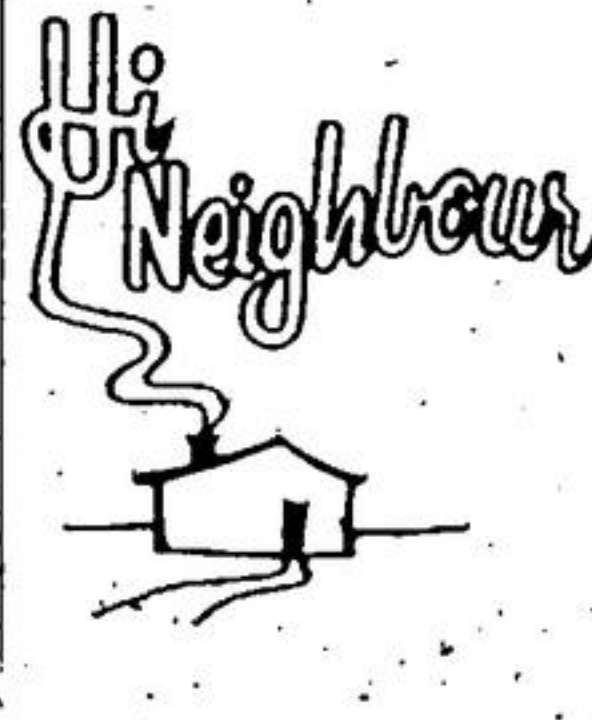
The Rover Crew will be at the demonstration - dispensing hot coffee.

Best Among "Rebels" Who Failed to Oust Diefenbaker

Halton County Progressive Conservatives including former Member of Parliament, Sandy Best, were among the anti-Diefenbaker faction that failed its objective at the party's national conference in Ottawa last week.

Two motions from Halton Conservatives were soundly defeated. They called for a secret vote on the leadership and an end to the Diefenbaker leadership limit.

But failure brought not apparent dissent in the Halton contingent. Halton PC head Gordon Beatty said, "Motion of confidence was probably the right thing, but our basic feelings are that it would be more desirable for a change to be made in the near future."

"We do not want to throw the man out but we felt some indignation must be given that the change is desired."

Beatty said that as a former candidate, Sandy Best was "an automatic delegate" to the conference.

Mr. Diefenbaker said it appeared to him that the Halton PC's were not carrying a resolution aimed to oust him, but "a guilt complex" over the loss of the riding to the Liberals.

"The action taken by the Halton Conservatives does hurt but I am sure I have friends in the riding as I have elsewhere in the country, and it is upon these true friends we will build for another victory" he declared.

When Mayor Gibbons' work Council Monday that the world of previous industrial commissions was "fruitless" he ruffled the feathers of Reeve Hill, the Deputy Reeve Hunter, who has been commission members several years.

Engage Engineers for Highway Renovations

The Toronto engineering firm of Damas and Smith has been engaged by the town to prepare plans and cost estimates for improving No. 7 Highway from Maple Ave. to the east town limits.

Council will proceed with at least part of the renovations this year depending on what the town road budget will allow. Georgetown's share of total costs is 10%, the rest being paid by the senior government.
