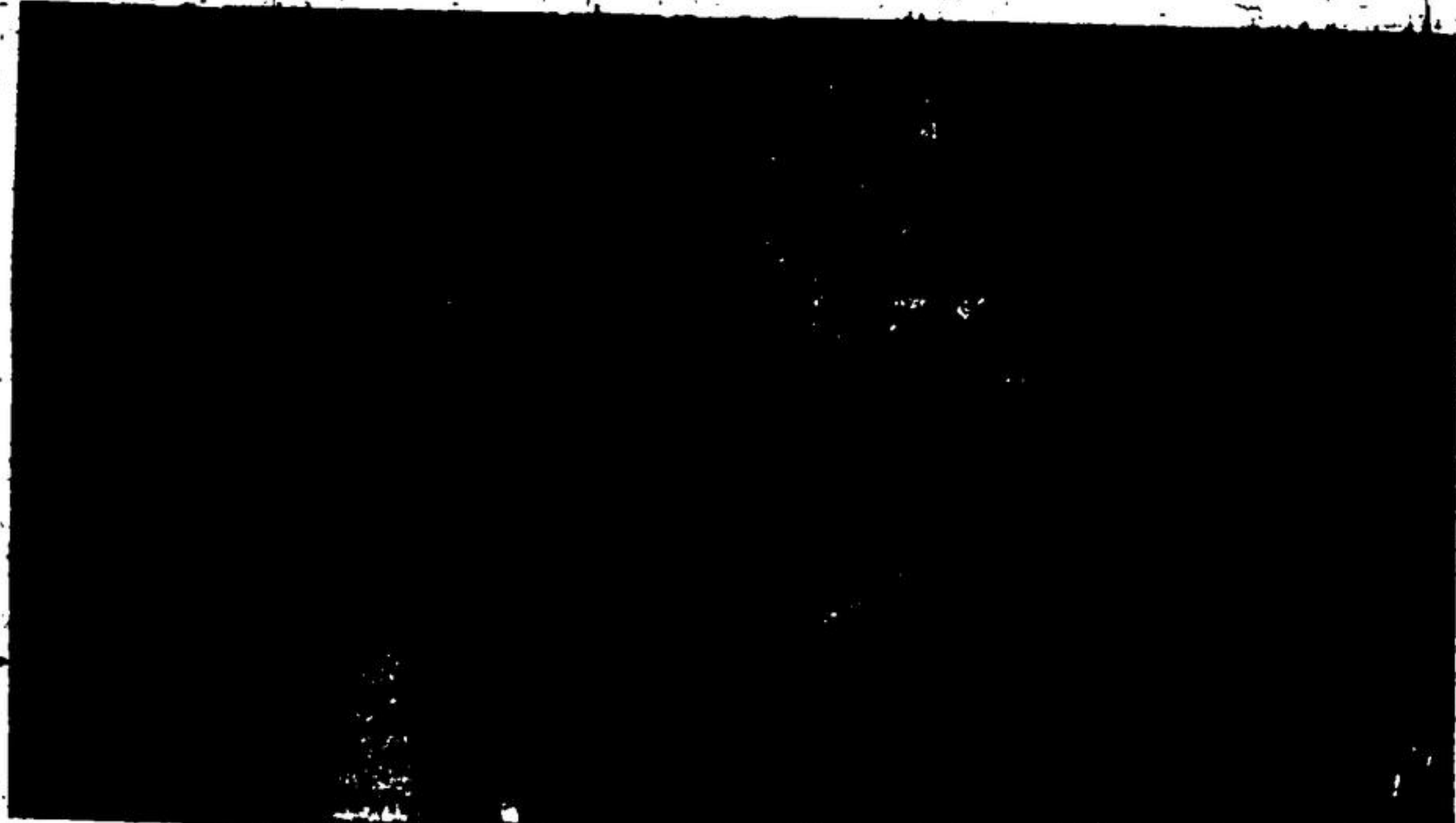


THEIR MESSAGES COULD DETERMINE STUDENTS' LIVES

Halton County Hog Producers held their annual meeting and election in the Dept. of Agriculture board room Tuesday afternoon, Feb. 11th with 21 of the county's 400 producers present.

Last year's officers were all returned to their posts — with John Wilson as president, Elmer Foster as vice president, and A. R. Service beginning his 16th term as secretary-treasurer. Mr. Service attempted to decline his nomination and suggested it was time the job was passed around to give other members experience, but consented to take the position when no other nominations came forward. The secretary was later granted an increase in remuneration from \$25 up to \$50.

Jim Boynton, secretary-manager of the Ontario Hog Producers' Association, was present to talk about the marketing system and he conducted the election.

Halton's Committee men to the Ontario marketing scheme are J. W. Wilson, Tom Broughton and Ron Davies. Lloyd May was named the delegate to the Halton Federation of Agriculture.
