## Support Group, Jr. 'A' Dads Clash Over Missing 'Thanks'

The \$10,000. paid the Georgetown Minor Hockey Support Group for players drafted from here by NHL clubs last year has created so much bad feeling and agitation that a member expressed regret at a MHSU meeting Sunday night.

"It's too bad we got that much money, we've had no trouble since," Herb Robinson, one of the original members of the support group said during a heated discussion at the meeting's conclusion. "It's left a bad taste in everyone's mouth."

"I think we were happier when we were operating in the old group president Syd Alcorn agreed."

The comments were brought on by an exchange of words between some of the group members and fathers of three of the boys involved in the draft that ruffled tempers on both sides.

Main source of annoyance to be three, Jack Dresswood, Gordon Lane and Jim Blair, who were MHSU's failure to show any appreciation to the support group for having brought about the group's present solvent condition.

thought the boys should have been given a suit or some money I would have come to a meeting and suggested it," he said.

Lane said the boys were "really nailed" for the money and didn't get a thing for it. "They got a chance to play pro hockey," said Alcorn.

"But they don't even get enough to buy clothes," said Lane. "As that our fault," asked Alcorn. Lane said it wasn't, but reiterated a cash donation would have helped.

When Herb Robinson wondered out loud if it was still too late for the group to make a gesture of thanks toward the five players, Lane said it was as far as he was concerned. Some of the group members said this was the first they had heard the details of Junior A support of their players and assumed they were well taken care of.

Hay tabled a motion that "thought he gave the discussion and the members came to the next meeting with a recommendation if they feel something should be done" for the five. It carried unanimously. When queried by Lane about

the \$10,000, Brunner queried amounts laid out for establishing the Junior B club, and purchasing new uniforms and equipment for the other five teams under the MHSU's wing. He said a balance of \$6,600.00 was in trust with the yearly interest, about \$300, earmarked for the support group treasury at the start of each year. He said the interest on the money will get the minor hockey started each year, a kind of guarantee it would resume yearly and the balance of the money necessary to keep the minor hockey wheels rolling, about \$4,000, annually, still has to be raised as usual through dances, lucky draws, tag days and other projects.

Bill James had the concluding remark, "I think we should straighten something out before we break up. References have been made to the \$2,000 given the Junior B club from the \$10,000. It should be made clear that this was not given the Juniors, but loaned them and will be paid back." Earlier, one of the fathers of the Jr. A players had taken exception to the Jr. Bs sharing the cash.

"You didn't even thank the kids," Lane claimed, charging they had been "taken advantage of."

"We've got a legitimate deal," said Dresswood, "you could have at least said to the kids, buy yourself a suit to go with."

Lane said the boys have to wear suits and ties much of the time and claimed the expenses they receive from the minor A clubs can't keep them as well-heeled as they should be. He said when all the necessities are deducted they are left with something like \$20 a week. The clubs pay the tuition fees for those attending school.

The phrase "take advantage" drew Alcorn's ire. He read a letter that was sent to NHL president which made inquiries about the obligation imposed on the drafted players and other details to indicate that the support group had shown due concern.

"Where do you think they (the five) would be if the support group had not been operating?" asked MHSU secretary Tom Brunner. "Do you think they were all pro prospects?" Alcorn added. He claimed five were drafted from here and the NHL clubs learned they were going to be tied up with a pro team," referring to the Junior B Montreal Canadiens affiliation.

Lane said Clarence Campbell in his letter assumed the Midgets from which the drafted players were drawn was a fully sponsored team suggesting the money should have gone to the Midget club. "As far as civil court is concerned, the draft is not legal anyway," he said, claiming such an agreement is only binding among hockey clubs. He said the draft could be squelched and the MHSU Hockey Support Group made to return the \$2,000 per player.

When Dresswood charged the group had been lax and unappreciative in not offering the players cash or a wrist watch, Alcorn said a line couldn't be drawn in offering such tokens. What about all the coaches and managers that handled these boys and worked so hard? Should we give some to them too. And all the coaches and managers down in the Saturday Morning leagues?"

G. Hay supported Alcorn's argument and said the group would have been "subsidized" to some extent. "If they had given the drafted players gifts and not others, if I was in your place and
