Guelph Couple Injured Flowers, Gardening In Collision in Norval Were Hobbies of Mrs. Kenneth Weston

Two Guelph people were injured when a tractor-trailer and car tangled at Norval Tues-

day night. Admitted to Guelph General Hospital with a fractured jaw and fractured left wrist was Ervin, who died in hospital in Elma. Adderson of 64 Union Georgetown on February 3rd Elm Ave., Guelph. With the same caution shown by other councils recently in dealing with school board spending, Esquising council handled two school boards requests.

In the first case they approved a proposed \$700,000 addition to Milton's Williams Ave. High School, but only to the extent that such costs are eligible for subsidy by the Department of Education.

In the second case, they withheld approval on a request by the Esquising School Board for an \$150,000 debenture issue to cover the cost of a three room addition to the Glen School, and a three room addition at Stewartstown school.

Before approval would be given, Council asked for a full breakdown of costs and estimates.

\$50,000 worth of township debentures for the Pineview School were eagerly sought by seven bidders, with the tender finally being awarded to the highest, Anderson & Co. Ltd., agents for the Royal Bank.

The tender price was \$90,376 on the \$54 bonds.

TEACHERS RATE BOARD AS TOPS

Nobody's perfect, but it seems boards can be.

That's the impression created by the annual rating of the high school board by Georgetown's secondary school teachers.

The result of the survey, released Monday, indicates all's well between high school teachers and employers.

The survey is conducted by the Ontario School Teachers Federation and probes three situations: the board's attitude toward educational improvement, the relations between board and staff, and working conditions. The GHS staff gave an "excellent" rating in each case.

The survey was conducted in December, 1963.

The OSSTF seeks the information to see just what their members think of the boards and to offer a guide to teachers looking for jobs.

The results go to the 10,000 OSSTF members in the province, and are supposed to be confidential.
