Dog Nuisance Increases Council Hires Assistant

Decisive action to end a dog nuisance in town was taken on Monday when council authorized remuneration for control officer George Harrington. Mr. Harrington has engaged an assistant who will devote at least 24 hours a week to patrolling.

Mayor Gibbons said he has also had many complaints, and while he expressed doubt that the present control system would work, he agreed to a month's trial period. Cr. Charles Hildebrandt would have a number of the town's staff assist in control until next Monday when Mr. Harrington's assistant starts. But when he tabled a motion to this effect, it was ruled out of order because of the previous motion for an assistant. The councillor made a second try later with a motion to call a special meeting to discuss the subject again.

Prominent Toronto Realtor Started Business in Town

John Armstrong Willoughby, 64, who retired recently after 64 years as a real estate broker died Saturday. In his business career, which started in Georgetown, he developed one of the largest family real estate businesses in Canada. The firm of J. A. Willoughby and Sons, Ltd., could account for the sale of millions of acres of farmland, residential lots, commercial and industrial sites.

A native of Canada, he had a lively stable in Georgetown, which has now become the premises of the Canadian Legion office. He opened a real estate office here in 1900, travelling first by horse and buggy. When a car was added, the Willoughby business advertised free rides to prospective customers to examine farms. The business later moved to the city, but he kept his Georgetown connections, spending much of his time at his summer home on Maple Avenue where he had his own stable, golf course and trout hatchery. The property was sold to a local group and is now North Halton Golf and Country Club.

Mr. Willoughby was one of the founders of the Georgetown Coated Paper Mills, which is now owned by Domtar. He was a past president of Toronto Real Estate board, a member of the Board of Trade club, the Kiwanis Club, Lambton Golf Club, the Granite Club, Zeland Masonic Lodge and Ramesses Shrine. His wife, Florence Motherall, died six months ago. He leaves his daughter, Margaret, Mr. Herbert A. Maguire, two sons, W. J. (Jack) and B. E. (Bert) Willoughby, and six grandchildren.

Milkman Injured When Truck, Car Collide

A milk route salesman, Lawrence Lalonde, 19 Guelph St., suffered a badly bruised back when his milk truck was in collision with a car on Guelph St., early Saturday morning. Police said the truck, owned by Steen's Dairy, 10 Water St., was eastbound on the highway when the westbound car, a '53 Chevrolet driven by Gary Robert Kenwick, 18 Victoria Crescent, struck the front end. The impact stopped the truck short, causing the heavy milk crates to slide forward injuring Lalonde.

The car continued over the sidewalk on the south side of Guelph St., between a pole and a tree, back over the pavement to the north shoulder. It stopped at the corner of Durham and Guelph, about 522 feet from the crash. Cr. Roy Henderson handled the investigation and placed property damage at \$400.00 to each vehicle. The accident happened at 6:15 a.m. The milk truck is number 13 in the dairy's fleet. Guelph and Mountview is becoming the scene of as many accidents as the hazardous Mountview-River Drive intersection. Sunday night cars driven by Gerald Klumpenauer of Brampton and Roxanne Cowbrough, 13 Hill Dr., Georgetown, came together at the flasher-light corner resulting in \$350. damage. Klumpenauer was driving a 1951 Chev. east on Guelph St., passing another car, and Roxanne Cowbrough was making a right turn from Mountview onto Guelph. The collision occurred at 10:20 p.m. and was investigated by Cst. Evan Rollins. A brake failure was blamed for a rear end collision on Main St. Thursday, February 26th, involving a 1961 GMC driven by Danny Wagstaffe, and a 1963 Ford Taxi driven by William Roy Willis. Both cars were proceeding east on Main. The cab, owned by Irene Kearns, 34 John St. E., stopped to pick up a fare and the truck rammed the back end. Cr. Dan Martin investigated at 4:20 p.m. and estimated the damage at \$250 to the truck and \$75 to the taxi.

Town Loses, Esquering to Retain Smith & Stone Land

Drop Rental Idea and Purchase New Truck

Assessment No Argument Says O.M.B. Chairman

Georgetown's bid to annex 46 acres of land in Esquering, which includes part of Smith & Stone, and Meadowcroft Mushrooms Growers was rejected by the Ontario Municipal Board on Thursday, after a day and a half long hearing in the Council chamber.

In giving the decision, chairman Armour L. McCrae, who along with William Shub, conducted the hearing, stated "The Board is satisfied that in large part Georgetown based its claim on the desire for the additional assessment, and at no time does the Board accept the criterion of assessment as grounds for annexation."

Mr. McCrae pointed out that in the Board's opinion there was ample serviced land in the community, and summed up by saying there had been insufficient consideration by the corporation of all elements before initiating the proceedings. Finally, he assessed the costs of reporting the hearing against the town.

Paul Entitled Y. A. Helson, lawyer for Georgetown, in presenting his case, stated that the town feels it has right to the assessment since it supplies services to part of the area proposed to be annexed. "We feel entitled to the tax revenue," he opined. He contended that the town needs better access to the area of the paper mills, and Smith and Stone, and that a proposed road from the junction of No. 7 Highway and Ontario St. would cut through the area under discussion, and link up with the ninth line, thus helping to alleviate traffic congestion. The control of the land surrounding the existing industrial land was desirable from the town's viewpoint, said Mr. Helson.

Both fire chief Erwin Lewis and Mrs. Johnson commended the neighbours. "They were a great help to us," the chief said. Dr. O'Dwyer was at the house when we got there. Police Court Leave Gaps, Seek Remedy

Police chairman Jim Emmerson is concerned about inadequate manpower when town police officers must appear in court at Milton. He told council Monday that on four occasions this year, the town was left with only one police officer on duty and all eight officers in Milton. "We used to have a local court and restoring this could be one solution," he said. "We certainly must have better protection in a town of 11,000." Mr. Emmerson is seeking an early appointment with the provincial attorney-general to discuss the matter.
