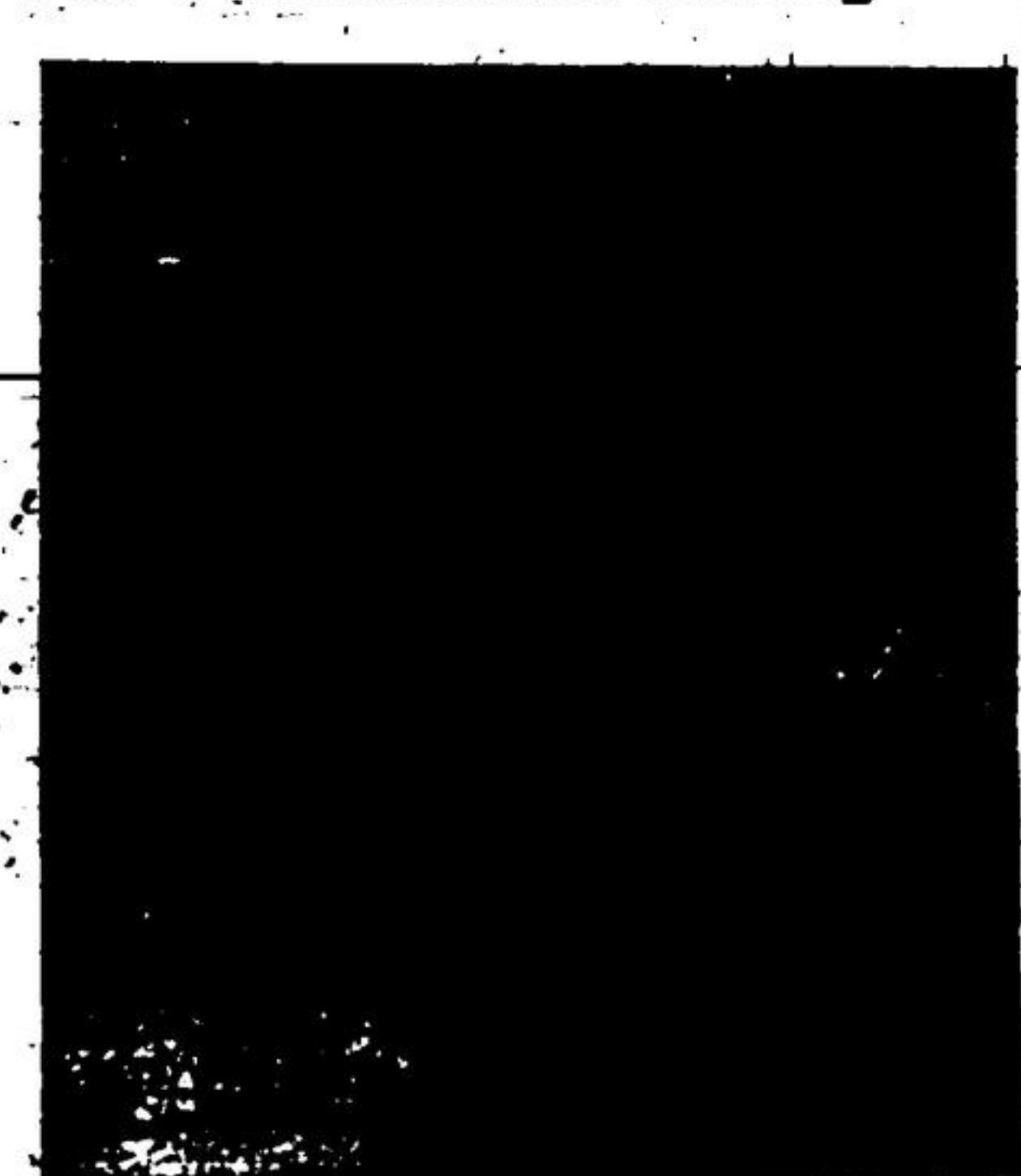


Wears Family Heirloom For Valentine Wedding

Tells Horticulturists Add Beauty with Evergreens

"How to achieve individuality in home gardening and foundation planting" was the underlying theme of a talk by the guest speaker at the regular monthly meeting of the Georgetown Horticultural Society held last Wednesday evening in the Howard Wrigglesworth School.

Mr. H. J. Herder, as chairman, introduced the speaker, Professor John A. Weal, recently retired from the Horticultural Staff of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph.

Professor Weal spelt out his talk with blackboard sketches of a house adding various stages of foundation planting. He warned of planting evergreens too close to the house and in soil unsuited to their natural growth. He suggested shrub Eucalyptus, or Winter Creeper which attaches itself to a wall by means of small roots, would be more suited in many cases.
