

# Raiders Have Champs Reeling Try to Finish the Job Here

Georgetown Raiders raised (1) the odds they'll pull off an upset (2) Orangeville Dufferins collective blood pressure (3) sagging fan interest, and (4) more than a few eyebrows in Orangeville Monday night.

Entered in the first WOAA League play-off in their lengthy history, the Raiders jolted the league soothsayers Monday by wrestling the lead in the semi-final play-off away from the team that copped the title last season and went through the recent schedule with just one loss.

The second setback suffered by the Orangeville Dufferins was here Sunday when Raiders evened the series with a 7-5 victory. Today the Duffs are on the ropes after Raiders delivered their second punch, a 6-4 triumph right in the champion's own lair.

Raiders can finish the table-turning trick right here Friday night since it's a best of five series.

Georgetown owned a 5-goal cushion riding into the final period Monday, tried to switch

to a defensive game and almost fumbled away the win. Within half the period Orangeville had rocketed back to within a goal of their brush with a goal of their brush with a goal. But Raiders managed to cork the flood before it swamped them and survive three penalties in the late stages of the struggle.

Bud Vary, who triggered 3 Raider goals, defenseman George Grassy and goalkeeper J. D. Cameron, stood out, but it took a team effort to stop the Dufferins.

Play was whittled down 20 times for infractions. Georgetown players drew 12 of the penalties.

Finnigan fed Bud Vary for the first goal at a minute and 35 seconds of the initial period which saw no more scoring. Theo Charlton from Rosa Cunningham boomed in number 2, and Georgetown was away to dominating the score sheet. Bud Vary from W. Cr. Charles Hildebrandt urged a bus service to the town's major shopping areas Monday, but found no apparent backers on council.

The councillor said merchants and the Delrex firm should get together and provide a system of transportation.

A couple of 12-seat vehicles, with a 25c fare was his idea. The town would enter the picture only to underwrite any possible deficit which he estimated could not pass \$5,000 yearly.

"In fact, there would be a good chance of a small profit from the system," he said.

Cr. Emmerson reminded him that a local firm already has the franchise and has tried on numerous occasions without being able to make it pay.

"That's a defeatist attitude," answered Cr. Hildebrandt. "People need transportation and we should at least investigate."
