Canadair Examines Avian "We're Interested"—V.P.

Officials of Canadair Limited, giant Montreal aircraft firm, flew to Wellington-Waterloo Airport near Kitchener Friday to watch a demonstration of Georgetown's Avian airplane. The group of pilots and engineers was led by George Keefer, vice president of Canadair.

"We were invited down to look at the plane and we accepted the invitation," said Mr. Keefer. "Most of us had heard of the plane but never had a chance to see it."

When asked whether Canadair might take over the construction of the plane and perhaps build a factory at the W & W Airport for the purpose, Mr. Keefer said the questions were premature.

"We just came to look at the plane. And we think it is a very interesting machine, but there is nothing more that can be added at the moment. Certainly the fact we're here shows we're interested."

As Canadair officials watched, the Avian's pilot put the plane through its paces demonstrating its ability to take off like a grasshopper and land at parachute speed. It was the fourth prototype built by Avian which has its head office and plant at Georgetown and into development of the aircraft.

Control of the company is now owned by Fred S. Walter, owner of the Thermo Electric Incorporated of the United States through its Canadian subsidiary Thermo Electric (Canada) Limited at Brampton. He has put more than \$250,000

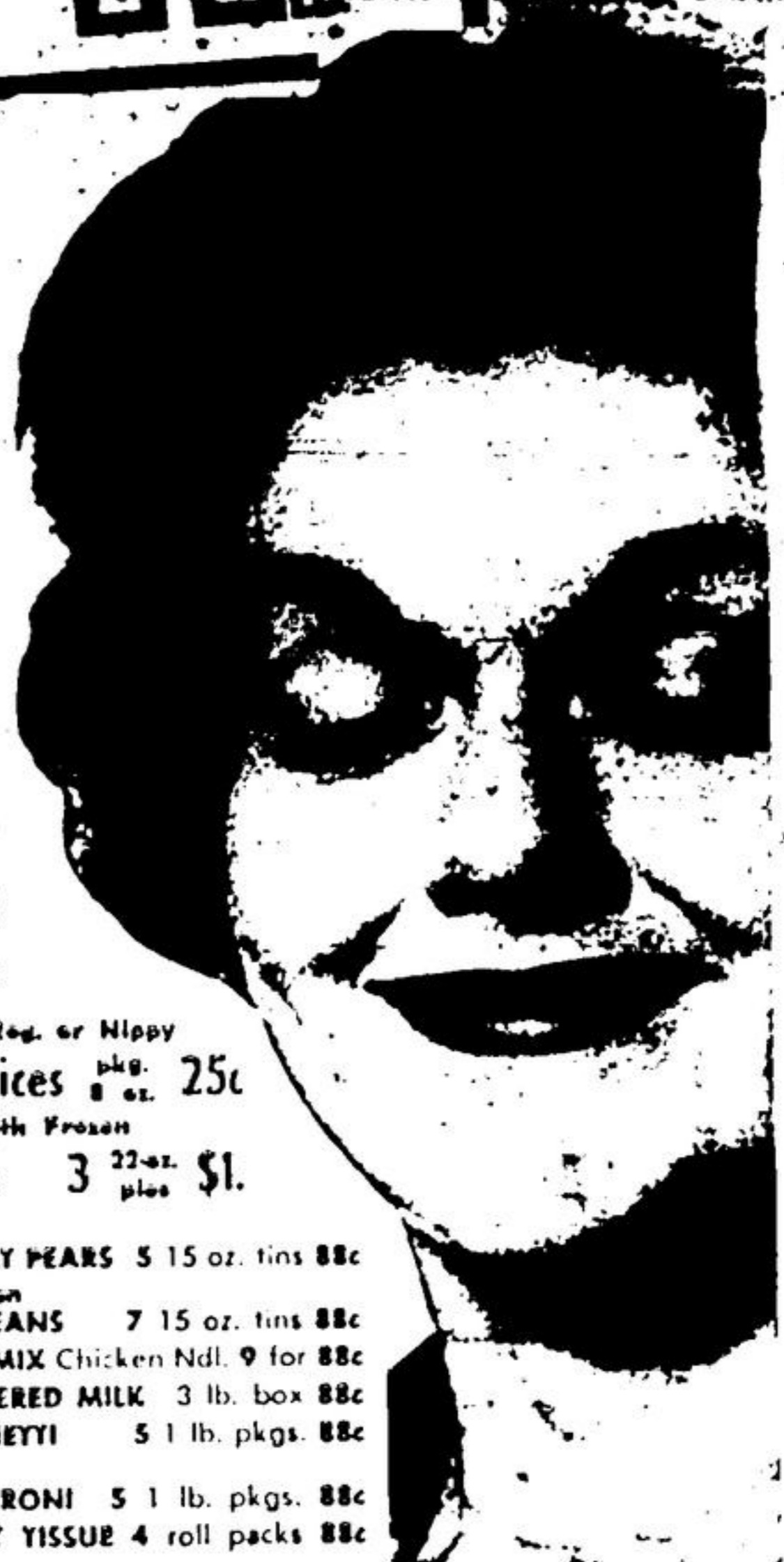
