Georgetown Teens are Terrific Give 'Striking' Display at CYB

The loudest supporting group at the Central Youth Bowling Championships in Galt last Sunday, came from Georgetown and they had a great deal to cheer about as the young Georgetown representatives bowled well in the competition. It was climaxed by the success of Joanne Barber in winning the Central Ontario Junior Girls Singles Champions and Nancy Parker and Joanne Mintern teamed to win the Central Ontario Junior Girls Doubles Championship. The three girls will compete in Toronto on March 22nd for the Ontario Junior Girls Singles and Doubles Championships. The Ontario Junior Girls Singles Champion will receive among her awards a \$500 education scholarship. Joanne Barber of Georgetown rolled an impressive 650 three-game total to earn her championship. She began with a 242 game to take a commanding lead over her opponents and finished with games of 106 and 221. Nancy Parker and Joanne Mintern appeared out of the running after the first game was rolled as they finished 86 pts behind the leaders from Port Credit. Undimmed, they fought back in the second game and bowled a fine 392 score. Nancy Parker leading the way with a 224 game. The Port Credit pair managed a 312 in the second game to hold their margin over Georgetown by six points. The Georgetown girls finished their last game before the Port Credit girls and amassed a 330 score for an overall total of 1022. Then came the trying period of watching and waiting for the Port Credit girls to finish their remaining 5 frames. A great roar arose as the Port Credit scores were tallied to be 1014 giving the Georgetown girls the championship by six pins. Georgetown had its share of heartbreak as well. Dave Graham of Georgetown bowling in the Senior Boys singles was locked in a tight race with Peter Bush of Streetsville after the first game had been completed. Dave Graham bowled 220 and Peter Bush 227. In the second game Dave Graham met the challenge and with a champion's determined effort bowled a 261 score while Peter Bush rolled a 200 score. This gave Dave Graham a 73 point lead going into the last game. His third game bowling well, then in the sixth frame he lost sight of the strike zone and from thereon was unable to obtain either a strike or spare. Meanwhile Peter Bush rose to the occasion bowling four strikes and a spare to finish with a score of 260 defeating Dave Graham by fifteen points, 666 to 681. The Georgetown Senior Boys doubles team of Keith Allen and Bill Anderson proved a team that never gives up. They were considered out of the running after five frames had been bowled in the last game. Suddenly in the sixth frame they both rolled strikes. The Georgetown cheering section was aroused as they continued to strike and spare through the remaining frames coming within six points of defeating the winners from Galt. Keith Allen bowled a 230 final game and Bill Anderson a 217 game for a team total score of 1207. The Galt team total was 1213. A fine effort was made by Marilyn Sigurdson of Georgetown in the Bantam Girls singles. Although Marilyn finished third, she was only 20 points away from the winner. The Central Ontario Youth Teams championships will be held at Georgetown Row, this Sunday at 1 p.m. Georgetown will be represented in the Junior Boys division, Junior Girls division, and the Senior Boys Division.

Upset Not In The Cards Raiders' Try Falls Short

Georgetown Raiders scored first and last in Orangeville on Monday night, sandwiching enough Dufferin goals to give them the WAAA semifinal series 3 games to 2. The 5-2 result was Orangeville's ticket to the finals against the winners of the Acton-Milton struggle still going on. For Raiders it was the end of the line. They led the set 2-1 but allowed Orangeville to come even with a win Friday night and then lost the ball in the maximum number of games. The fact they extended the reigning champs was evidence of their improvement in the second half of the schedule. Raiders were slow getting off the dime this year and owned a dismal win-loss record at New Years but in the stretch they were second only to their eliminators in their success. Much of the sudden development was due to players finally getting used to their line mates, and just as much was due to the return of casualties who picked up wounds in the earlier part of the schedule. It was Raiders first season in the Western Ontario Athletic Association after a lengthy and glowing campaign in the OHA. Jamie Cunningham was the Raider figure-head in their bow-out game. He scored the first goal at 2:31 of the initial period from Theo Charlton and set up the last goal at 3:09 of the third that Mike Finnigan scored. Between them Orangeville wedged two goals by Paul Courtney and singles by Grant Smith, Rob McDonald and Montgomery. It was 2-1 at the end of 20 minutes and 5-1 after 40. Had Raiders a potent power play they might still be in the thick of the play-offs. The referees caught 13 infractions, just five of them perpetrated by Georgetown. Raider spirit took a kick in the teeth when Orangeville went ahead on a goal that was practically an accident. With the clubs deadlocked and action in the Raider zone a scramble developed at the edge of the crease. Players from both sides guffed at the unco-operative disc with no results. Finally it bounced out of the maze like a rubber ball, crazily eluded goalie J. D. Cameron and wobbled painfully over the goal line.
