Pare High School Costs Esqueusing Asks Board

A motion urging the Georgetown District High School Board to pare their budget estimates was sent by Esqueusing Council, to the High School Board, through the Esqueusing representative Donald Lawson, after a long discussion on the proposed budget.

Mr. Lawson presented the proposed budget to Esqueusing Council for their opinion and direction, before the budget was finally accepted.

Esqueusing Council felt the costs were much too high, and should be cut, subsequently they passed the motion saying:

"That this council be seriously concerned with the large increase in the proposed budget for the Georgetown and District High School, and they strongly urge the Board to pare their estimates wherever possible, and instruct the township representatives on the Board to bend every effort in this direction."

"Well, it was worth a try," commented Frank Sturges, when Council rejected his plea that he be allowed to build a house with less floor space than the newly amended building by-law requires.

"I bought the 8 acres at the Check Line and the Fifth Line about three years ago when the requirement was only 800 sq feet," he explained. "But now I hear it is 1,000."

Heave Leslie pointed out that he could hardly make a special case out of one man.

Mr. Sturges took his rejection cheerfully.

Architect Don Hallford, designer of the township building, recommended the payment of the final hold back of \$15,151 and contractor J. B. Mackenzie and Son.

"Suppose we pay in full, and the rain comes in," queried Heave G. Leslie.

"You have a one year guarantee, anyway," replied the architect, "after that it is up to me to stand behind my design."

Reassured, council voted to pay the final payment.

W. R. Greenley was awarded the tender for crushed gravel at a cost of 78c a ton, delivered up to 5 miles from his pit, after five miles an additional charge of 5c a ton mile will be charged.

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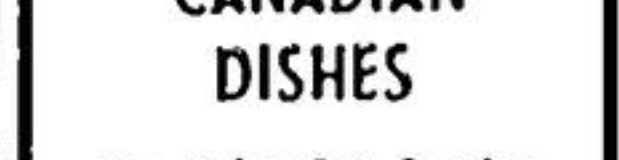
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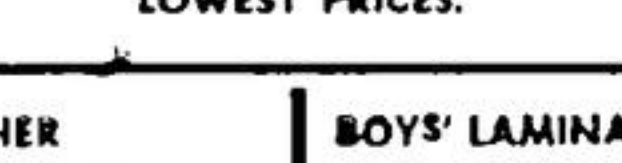
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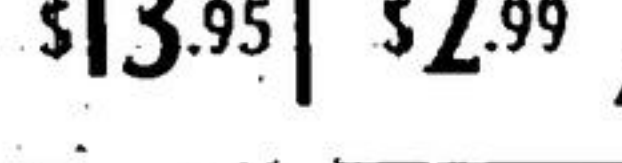
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
