Cornell Hockey Scholarship Beckons to Jack Gudgeon, Jr.

Jack Gudgeon, Georgetown's top scorer, will probably be securing goals for an American university next year instead of this town's entry in the Metro Junior B loop.

One of the Ivy League Universities, Cornell, at Ithaca, N.Y., has offered Gudgeon an attractive deal that has all the features of a hockey scholarship and the blond centre is eyeing the overture with a receptive mind.

Cornell will provide Gudgeon's tuition and room and find him a job in a fraternity house that will earn him enough money for incidentals. In exchange, they get his talent for the duration of the B.A. course. Cornell plays in a league with Yale, Harvard, Princeton, Army and Navy.

Jack and his dad, Jack Sr., answered an invitation and drove to the university for a two day talk with head coach Ned Harkness. While there, Jack submitted his application for enrolment, but his acceptance will hinge on an examination he will write on May 2. If he passes that he's a Cornell hockey freshman. Right now he's taking some grade 12 and grade 13 subjects at Georgetown High School.

"Hockey is the big interest in the Ivy League," Jack Gudgeon Sr. told The Herald. "Jack and I attended a game between the Cornell freshmen and the varsity while we were there, and it was good, fast hockey." Harkness told us that when one of the big three, Harvard, Yale or Cornell, play each other the crowd line up for tickets three hours before game time. By 8:30 the arena is packed and the game don't start until 8. An indication of the hockey interest there is the bill for new equipment to outfit the varsity team last year — \$8,000. And travelling is no problem — the university owns its own passenger plane.

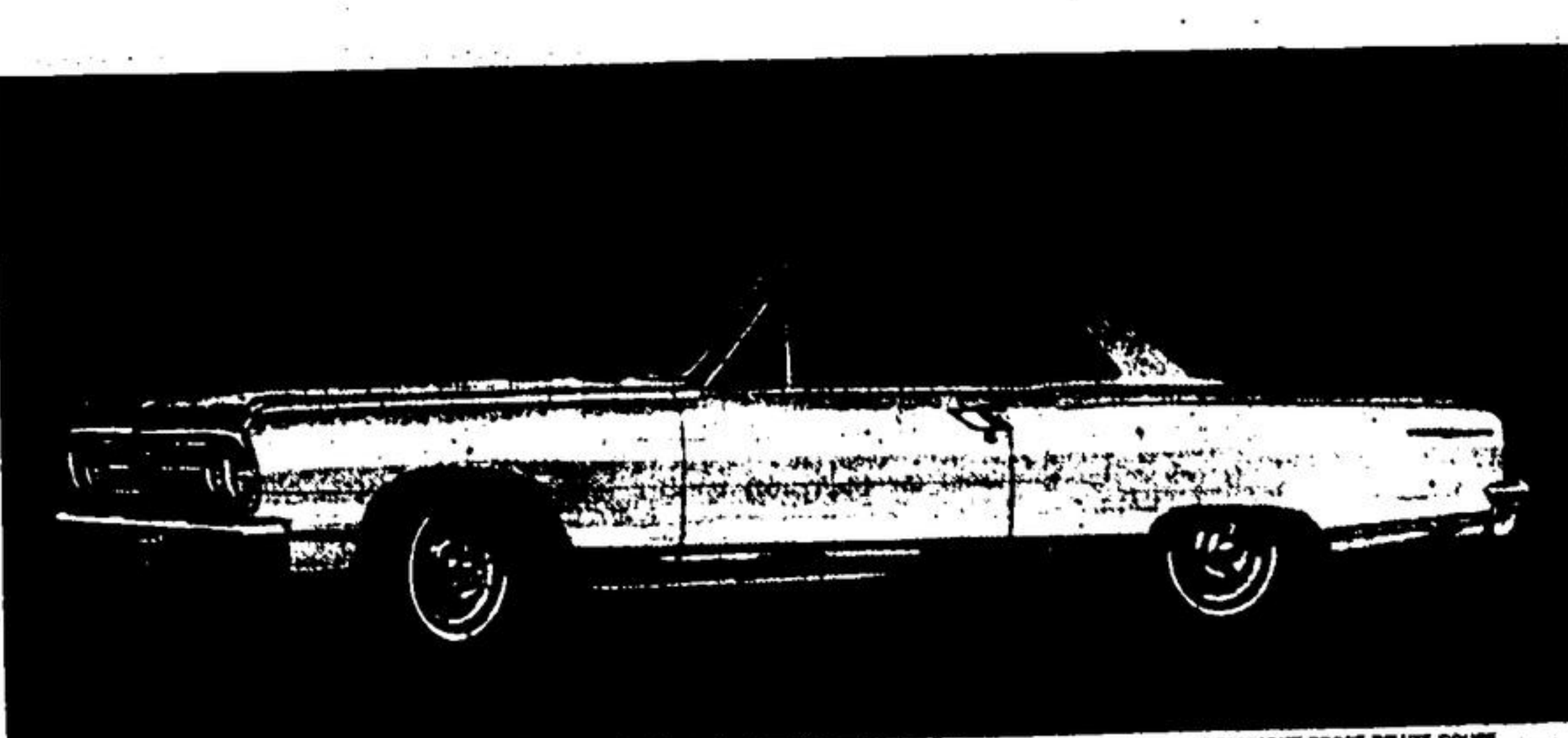
