## Midgets 3 Goals Up In Leamington Series

About this time last year Georgetown Midgets were proving the exception in local sports circles by breaking down the wall of apathy that keeps Georgetown Memorial Arena an echo chamber for most of the hockey season. Crowds of 1000-plus, were standing shoulder-to-shoulder while adding momentum to the town midgets in the stretch drive with their vocal chords. The electric anticipation of those final games was evident Sunday afternoon when 800 customers watched Georgetown Midgets take their first step toward a little defense by lacing Leamington 4-1 in game 1 of a double-meeting, total goals semi-final series that will conclude in the Home-of-Helms this Saturday.

The three goal margin isn't an insurmountable difference by any means. Leamington organized in the early stages of the game, undoubtedly cost them goals. Once they shook the first period jitters they were a different team and showed enough muscle to keep the net in doubt.

Marty Wheeler struck first, scoring with just 35 seconds gone in the first period. Stan Kynnersley made it 2-0 from Gib Murdoch at the 2:30 mark and Marty Wheeler blasted a slapshot from well out that made it 3-0 at 18:20.

Bill Dwyer assisted on the third marker which came with Leamington a man short. The scoring was even in the second period, Gib Murdoch notching Georgetown's 4th counter from Terry Hay, and McDonald scoring from G. Phibbs, and T. Wales to spoil the shut-out.

Close checking marked the third period in which both teams missed good scoring chances. Georgetown drew 15 minutes in penalties and Leamington 13 minutes.

## Classification Change but Giants Remain Intermediate

A change in the Ontario Baseball Association classifications has caused some changes in the status of Halton County intermediate teams. Georgetown Giants, who played as an intermediate B team their first year and as an intermediate A team last year will remain in the A bracket for towns 10,000 to 19,999. But Oakville Oaks will be shifted from intermediate A to Senior. The classification wiped out the old intermediate A major grouping and upped the population requirements for all classifications. A change in classifications was one of two major pieces of legislation adopted at the OBA convention in Chatham on the weekend. Last season another Halton County team, Campbellville Merchants, entered the senior playdowns and missed a provincial title for the first time in almost a decade. Campbellville will remain eligible to play in the new intermediate D grouping for towns of under 2,000 people. Merchants are expected to play in the toughest classification. No Halton teams are eligible for the C grouping for towns between 2,000 and 4,999 people. Both Milton Red Sox and Dundas Merchants fit into the B groups for towns of between 4,500 and 9,999. The other major piece of legislation will permit youngsters to play an unlimited number of games in a higher age bracket. More than 250 delegates attended the two day session which opened Friday. Main speaker and guest was publicity director Neal "Doc" Venkell of the Detroit Tigers.

## Ring Tailed Pheasants to Be Released in Future

Stan Price, deputy game warden, revealed today that his department will release up to 3,000 English ring-tail pheasant, and several thousand speckled trout within the next month. The game will be released in the woods and creeks of Nassagaways and Esqueping townships and parts of Halton County. "Of course we are not saying where they will be released," he chuckled. The game deputy said the deer herds are increasing despite the number of casualties among their numbers due to illegal hunting and those killed on the highways. Price said there were two does killed on Highway 25 just west of Milton over the weekend. Both the does were bearing twin fawns. The embryos from the does were sent to the Department of Agriculture College at Guelph.
