**TOBACCO COMPLAINTS NOT NEW, RESEARCH SHOWS**  
Everyone reading the American report on smoking being one of the causes of cancer thought that the objection to tobacco and smoking was one of the hazards of modern living. However, to prove there is nothing new under the sun the following is a statement made by King James I. in 1604, counterbalancing the use of tobacco that was brought to England in 1565 by Sir John Hawkins and later by Drake and Sir Ralph Lane and that had been made fashionable in the Court by Sir Walter Raleigh.  
"It is not both great vanity and insolence that at the table a place of respect, of cleanliness, of modesty, men should not be ashamed to sit toasting of tobacco pipes, and puffing the smoke one to another, making the filthy smoke and stink thereof to exhale about the dishes and infect the air? The public use whereof, at all times and in all places, hath now so far prevailed as divers men have been at least forced to take it also, without desire. Moreover, which is a great iniquity, the husband shall not be ashamed to reduce thereby his delicate, wholesome and clean complexioned wife to that extremity, that either she must also corrupt her sweet breath therewith, or else resolve to live in a perpetual stinking torment. A custom loathsome to the eye, hateful to the nose, harmful to the brain, dangerous to the lungs, and in the black stinking fume thereof, nearest resembling the horrible stygian smoke of the pit that is bottomless."

Faulkner when I noticed smoke coming up through the floor," he recalled.  
Mrs. Faulkner and Milford rushed to the rear of the dance hall and down a stairwell to the basement where they found four of the six children and sent them to safety.  
The twins, Peter and Paul, age 3, were still in the apartment when their mother and Milford entered a burning living room area and pulled them out.  
Mrs. Faulkner half climbed, half fell up the basement steps to safety, her hair on fire.  
Once outside she put out the fire in her hair with her hands and then joined the children in a nearby automobile. Milford summoned the Georgetown fire department.  
Will Faulkner, owner of the Music Box, was out of the building when the fire started. He came home to find his wife and children and mother-in-law huddled in the car and his dance hall ablaze.  
Faulkner rescued two dogs from the rear of the building when he arrived.  
Firemen were hampered in their efforts to save the interior by dense smoke and a shortage of water.  
Flame was run along the town line for a quarter mile to a farm pond when the fire department's pumper trucks were drained dry. The firefighters wore face masks and air tanks.  
The dance hall was a favourite meeting place for teenagers in the Georgetown, Milton, Brampton area. Faulkner said the loss was in the neighbourhood of \$20,000 to the building and contents.  
He said he believed the fire started in a wood furnace.  
Mrs. Faulkner said she was making cookies before going up to serve Milford. She said there was no smoke or signs of fire when she left the apartment.  
Mrs. Faulkner was treated at the scene by Georgetown firemen. She complained of burns to her eyes.  
The Faulkners lost most of their clothing and furniture a few months ago when the house they were living in, next door to the music box burned to the ground one windy night.  
The Red Cross, Esquevas Township and Georgetown Fire Department are taking care of the family and the Salvation Army has also offered to assist. Some of the children are staying with relatives for the time being.

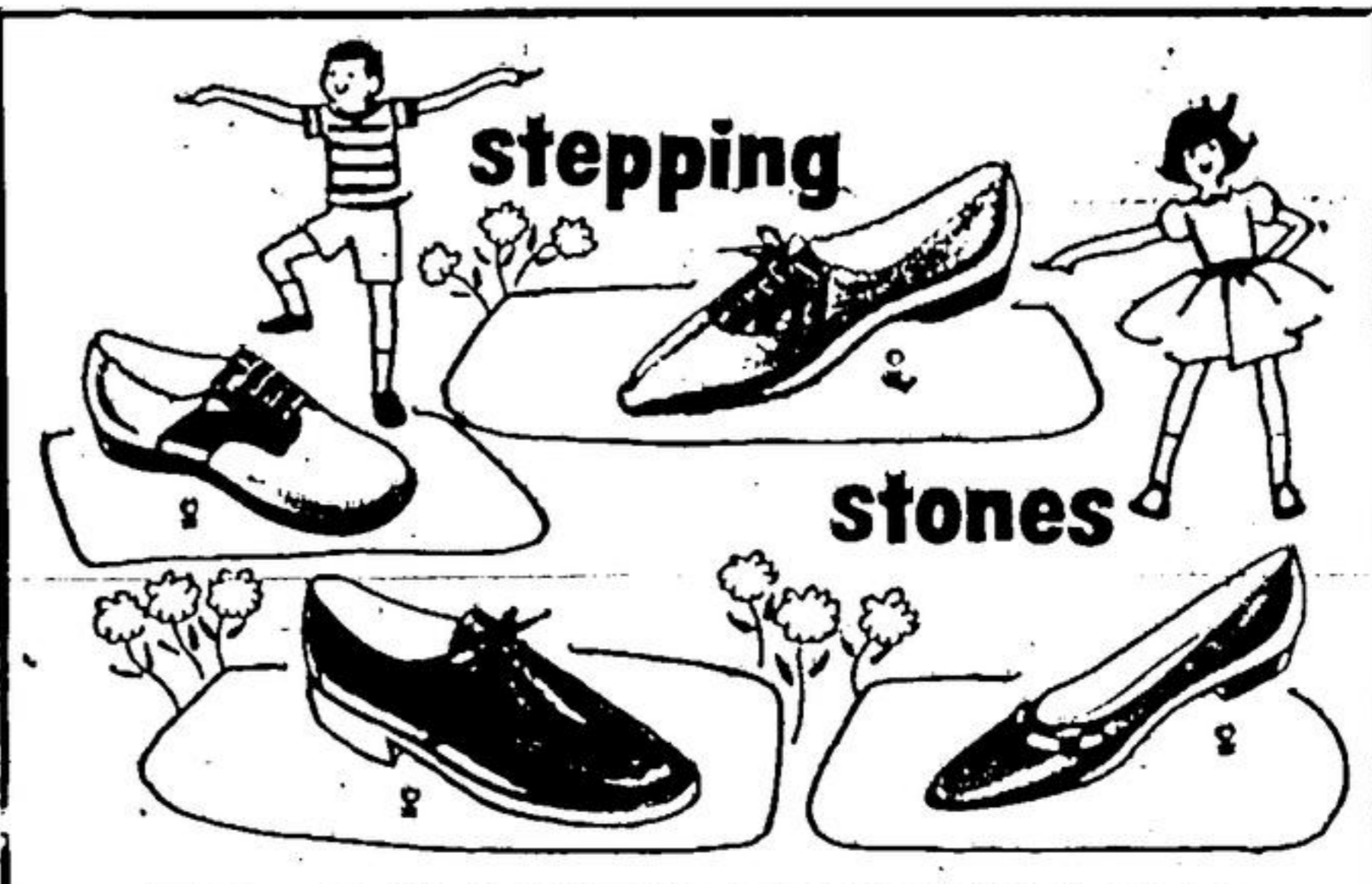
