NHA Increase Proposed Georgetown Builders Upset

Reports that interest rates for loans under the National Housing Act will be increased shortly were termed today "speculative" by Dr. H. Harley in Ottawa.

In a long distance telephone conversation, the Malton M.P. said that the matter of increasing the said interest rates from six-and-a-quarter to six-and-three-quarters is and has been for some time "under consideration."

Interest rates for loans to house purchasers under the National Housing Act will be increased to six and three-quarters per cent from six and one-quarter, an informed source revealed this week.

The increase, which will add approximately \$100 to the cost of the average home in Canada has not been officially announced yet from Ottawa but it should be made known this week.

Georgetown builders are up in arms over the interest rate increase which they termed one more imposition both on the builder and the buyer.

The announcement of the increase comes at the same time that a four per cent raise in sales tax on building materials will contribute to a further increase in the price of an average home.

Beginning yesterday, an extra four per cent is added to the sales tax established last year, which with the three per cent provincial sales tax and the 11 per cent federal sales tax will take away in taxation much of the purchase price.

"It makes you want to get out of the business," one disgusted builder said when he learned of the increased interest rate.

If released this week as expected it would add \$100 to the purchase price of a \$20,000 home, interest on which is approximately \$2,300.

"First they give you a \$500 winter building bonus then they take it away this way," said another builder.
