Bruce Trail Incentive Discover Nature's Beauty

More people are getting on their feet and rediscovering the benefits of walking. This fact was revealed by an official of the Iroquois Bruce Trail Club of Hamilton today.

The Bruce Trail which crosses thro' the Georgetown area enroute from Queenston to the Niagara Peninsula to Toronto at the northern tip of Bruce Peninsula has added a new incentive to peripatetics both old and young.

The trail will be 450 miles long when it is completed and combines both educational and recreational values and an opportunity to observe nature at first hand — almost untouched by civilization.

Where possible, the trail goes through woodlands and natural ways. Existing paths are sometimes used but in some places the trail winds through stretches untrod by man a few years ago. Stiles and bridges have been erected in some places.

No government funds were involved in the Bruce experiment. People from all walks of life, working together, are building the trail. For the most part it runs through private property and the permission of the landowners is solicited and also their voluntary contribution.

At present in Dundas Valley where the trail is already open to the public, the response has been amazing. Local commercial firms donated nails, lumber and paint. But the greatest contribution was the greatest — they brought their own tools — axes, saws, hammers, pruners and shovels. Coupled to this they helped to build the trail.

Iroquois is the name given to the tourist region from Grimsby through Hamilton to Burlington. The club gave it this name since 80 to 85 miles of the trail will pass this way.

Near Georgetown, the trail passes through Limehouse, Silvercreek and Terra-Cotta.
