For the benefit of the taxpayers of Georgetown, I submit the following in regard to sewage payments.

During the year 1962, when the Ontario Water Resources Commission had submitted its plan for the 30-year repayments for our new million dollar sew es plant, the following is not ed in my reporting of our counell sessions:

premises On June 4th, ralepayer 'Hobert Letts appeared before counell to protest taxpayers having to subsidize industry regarding powage paymenti.

On August 27th the then Mayor stated that the onus was on Industry to establish by metering what it chimed was NOT being returned to the sewers. Council fully backed

this stand. A submission by the management of one industry for relief without metering and on fig. ured arrived at by other means elicited this reply from council:

Dear Sir; Reference is made to 1962, and I have been directed to reply as follows. It is the feeling of council that any matters of dispute, under the Sewer Service By-Law can only be effectively settled by Sew-

age being metered. In fairness and justice to all users under this By-Law. Council must adhere to the terms set out therein since they are charged with raising the necessary POTENDOS.

It is for this reason that the Proctor & Redfern Beort is used as the basis for Service Charges. In view of this, any this report should be prepared to install a meter so that' actual evidence is

available for the Council to act upon. Vailing this evidence, Council has no alternative but to abide by the Proctor & Redfern In view of these feelings by Council, it is suggested that the water accounts


